January 10, 2018

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in a regular session on Wednesday, January 10, 2018 at 6:00 PM in the Commissioners' Room, 116 Adams Street, Plymouth, NC. Commissioners Johnson, Phelps, Riddick, and Walker were present. Also present were County Manager/County Attorney Curtis Potter and Clerk to the Board Julie J. Bennett. Commissioner Sexton was unable to attend.

Commissioner Walker gave the invocation. Commissioner Riddick led the pledge of allegiance.

<u>ADDITIONS/DELETIONS</u>: Ms. Bennett requested to delete Item 4, Recognition for Employee of Year (and move it to the budget meeting that will be held later in January), and add Item 5A Resolution Extending Date by Which Washington County Taxes May Be Paid Without Interest, and 5B Resolution Extending Date by Which Washington County Water Bills May Be Paid Without A Late Fee

CONSENT AGENDA: Commissioner Walker made a motion to remove Item E,
Board Penalty Release: Phelps Tree Service, Inc., from the Consent Agenda and vote on it
as a separate item. Commissioner Riddick seconded, motion passed unanimously.
Commissioner Walker made a motion to approve the amended Consent Agenda.
Commissioner Riddick seconded, motion passed unanimously.

- a) Approval of Minutes
- b) Tax Refunds & Releases and Insolvent Accounts
- c) Resolution: K-3 Class Size Reduction
- d) Resolution: Jury Commission Fees

Commissioner Phelps stated he would like to be recused from voting on Item E, Board Penalty Release: Phelps Tree Service, Inc. since the owners are members of his family even though he receives no monetary gain from the business.

<u>Commissioner Riddick made a motion to recuse Commissioner Phelps from voting on Item E, Board Penalty Release: Phelps Tree Service, Inc. Commissioner Walker seconded, motion passed unanimously.</u>

Commissioner Riddick made motion to approve the Board Penalty Release for Phelps Tree Service, Inc. Commissioner Walker seconded, motion approved 3-0 (with Commissioner Phelps recused and Commissioner Sexton absent.)

<u>PUBLIC FORUM</u>: Ms. Ann Keyes, Emergency Management Director, stated the County had 10" of snow last week. It was almost impossible for the County to deal with but she wanted to commend the staff that assisted her, especially Mr. Andrew Coccaro, EMS Director and Mr. David Tawes, Public Utilities Director. DOT did an outstanding job on the County roads. The County's Courthouse parking lot and the DSS parking lot were cleared by Domtar with help from Mr. Mike Nihoa. Ms. Keyes said she hopes to get the same assistance if we encounter snow again. Chair Johnson rode along with Ms. Keyes to assess the streets. Ms. Keyes thanked Mr. Potter for his help in managing this weather event. Chair Johnson thanked Ms. Keyes for all her efforts.

ECONOMIC IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL, INC. (EIC) 2018 GRANT APPLICATION:

Ms. Bennett explained to the Board that each year the EIC is required to submit a copy of their Grant Application to the Board of Commissioners. Ms. Bennett noted that a copy of the EIC's 2018 grant application was in the Commissioners' Agenda Package. This document is for information only –no action is needed. (*A copy of this application is on file in the Clerk's office*.) Chair Johnson told the Commissioners that if they have any issues with the EIC application to please give their comments to the Clerk. Dr. Mason, EIC Director, will be coming to a future meeting to speak to the Board.

<u>ANIMAL SHELTER UPDATE:</u> Sheriff Barnes gave a proposal to the Board for several fixes that are needed at the Animal Shelter.

volunteer shelter. Sheriff Barnes said they have two volunteers that come out a couple times a day to feed and water the animals.

<u>Fund for repairing the fencing at the Animal Shelter.</u> Commissioner Phelps said he felt this would show Dr. Norris (from the State's Veterinary Office) that progress is being made.

<u>Commissioner Riddick seconded.</u> Commissioner Riddick also asked that Sheriff Barnes go out for more estimates on the remaining items to be done at the Animal Shelter. <u>Motion passed unanimously.</u> Commissioner Phelps asked if the repairs to the fence would be completed before the next Commissioners' meeting. Sheriff Barnes stated he thought the work on the fencing would completed by then.

RESOLUTION EXTENDING DATE BY WHICH WASHINGTON COUNTY TAXES MAY BE PAID WITHOUT INTEREST: Mr. Potter stated that this came to the County's attention during the aftermath of the snowstorm. Mr. Potter said that other local counties are looking at having extensions for paying their taxes because of the inclement weather and the County's offices were closed. Ms. Wilkins, County Tax Administrator, spoke to the Board and said the statute states that counties should not extend the tax deadline. Ms. Wilkins went on to say that the County tax bills went out in July. Ms. Wilkins's said her opinion is that the County should stick to the January 5th deadline. However, if the Commissioners extend the deadline, it will put a lot more work on the Tax Office staff. They have already completed the mail from Monday and entered it into the system. It would be a hardship on the Tax Office to "undo" this.

Commissioner Phelps said he is a big proponent of the Tax Office, but he disagreed with Ms. Wilkins. In all fairness, Commissioner Phelps feels the Commissioners should extend the deadline by the number of days the County offices were closed. Commissioner Phelps said he also feels there should be a public notice put out to let the public know of the extension. Commissioner Walker said he had one individual say something to him about the Tax Office being closed and not being able to pay their taxes. Commissioner Walker said it was the day staff left early (Wednesday) and this person came to pay and the office was already closed.

Chair Johnson said she had been in contact with Bertie and Pitt counties and the way their payments are put in are different. Ms. Wilkins said agreed, those counties use a different system.

Mr. Potter discussed the public notice issue. Mr. Potter said the County can put information regarding the extension of the deadline on the County website and Facebook pages. The County is somewhat limited by having only a weekly paper. It's helpful to get the information out there, but realistically, you would think that a person would come the next day after they missed a deadline. Commissioner Phelps asked about using Ms. Keyes' "robo call" to get the word out.

Ms. Wilkins asked the Commissioners if this extension includes everything postmarked by January 11 and people who walk in and pay that day. The consensus of the Board was yes.

Commissioner Phelps made a motion to approve the resolution extending the date by 3 days in which Washington County taxes may be paid without interest to be January 11 by 5:00 PM including any payments postmarked by January 11. Commissioner Riddick seconded, motion carried unanimously.

RESOLUTION EXTENDING DATE BY WHICH WASHINGTON COUNTY WATER BILLS MAY BE PAID WITHOUT A LATE FEE: Mr. Potter stated that this resolution is similar to the resolution just approved for the Tax Office. The Board could approve a resolution extending the date to pay County water bills without a late fee to January 15th.

Commissioner Phelps asked why give citizens to the 15th instead of 11th (like the Tax Office). Mr. Potter said it will make it easier on the Water Department because they will have to do data entry on the 15th anyway.

Mr. David Tawes, Public Utilities Director, said he didn't have an opinion one way or the other. On a \$24 bill, the late fee is \$.36 cent.

Chair Johnson said she likes doing the 3 day extension for consistency for extensions on both Tax and Water bills.

Commissioner Walker made a motion to approve the resolution extending the date by 3 days to January 11 in which Washington County water bills may be paid without a late fee. Commissioner Phelps seconded, motion carried unanimously.

CHILD SUPPORT CONTRACT UPDATE: Ms. Lynn Swett, DSS and Mr. Phil Lassiter, DSS State Office spoke to the Board regarding the Child Support Contract. DSS will now have to show the child support contract as a fee collected. Some funds will still show up in the County. It is a new interpretation of the policy. Mr. Lassiter explained that if the County doesn't continue with the contract, DSS funds will need to be increased through the County. Either way it will cost the County money. Mr. Lassiter went on to explain that expenditures are not claimed now but will have to be—such as attorney rates. The cost of the attorney fees are currently covered in the contract.

Commissioner Phelps said he feels he needs more information and numbers to make a decision. Mr. Lassiter said the cost would be approximately \$26,000 to keep the position and the contract and approximately \$25,000 if the County doesn't keep the position and contract. Mr. Lassiter said this scenario is just an estimate. Mr. Potter told the Board it was being brought to the Board now in case the County (DSS) decides not to keep the contract and to let Hyde County and Tyrrell County know they will need to find a way to have this service.

Commissioner Phelps asked if the County could renegotiate the contract. Mr. Potter said yes, the contract could be negotiated. It's been 8 years since the County first started with this contract; however, the County needs to find out what a fair and marketable price is for the service we are providing. Mr. Potter said he will work with DSS to see about renegotiating the contract.

RIVERLIGHT TRANSIT'S DRUG & ALCOHOL TESTING POLICY UPDATE: Ms. Lynn Swett, DSS, said the major difference in the current contract than is on page 2/b under drugs—it has been added that a driver must have a written release from a doctor. Ms. Swett said other changes were minor such as changing DOT to USDOT.

Commissioner Phelps made a motion to approve Riverlight Transit's Drug & Alcohol Testing Policy Update. Commissioner Walker seconded, motion passed unanimously.

RE: Local Option Sales Tax Referendum

Background:

TO:

- The Board has consistently expressed interest to staff in resubmitting a referendum to the voters to approve their authority to levy an additional ¼ cent local option sales tax on certain purchases of personal property as a method of generating additional (estimated at over \$177,000) and potentially more equitable revenues, without having to potentially further increase the ad-valorem real property tax rate which is paid for solely by Washington County land owners/citizens as opposed to the local option sales tax which would be paid by both citizens and non-citizens (tourists/visitors/etc.) making purchases of certain personal property within Washington County.
- A previous referendum that was held on relatively short notice and without much advance effort being
 made to educate the public about the impact of a local option sales tax in May, 2016 failed to pass with
 58.67% opposed, and 41.33% in favor.
- It is believed that with more direct efforts to educate the public about the potential impact of a local
 option sales tax in Washington County, voters may approve the tax if given the chance to do so through
 another referendum in 2018.

Frequently Asked Questions regarding local option sales tax

Counties have the option to increase the sales tax by 1-quarter of a penny, (the Article 46 sales tax in N.C. G.S. 105-535) provided the public approves via a referendum.

Question: What are the steps a county needs to consider when scheduling a referendum?

Answer: All counties must contact their local board of elections and the State Board of Elections in order to have the advisory referendum included on the ballot during a regularly scheduled election. An advisory referendum may be held only on the same date as a county or statewide general election, the primary election in even-numbered years, or in any other election during which all precincts in a county are open.

Question: Must the Board of County Commissioners levy the sales tax if the voters approve the referendum? Answer: A Board of County Commissioners is not obligated to levy the tax even if the majority of those voting in a referendum vote in support of a levy.

Question: Can a county stipulate uses of the monies on the ballot as a part of the referendum?

Answer: A county may not stipulate the use of the money on the ballot. A county Board of Commissioners may adopt a resolution that stipulates how they plan to use the revenues.

Question: Is there a prescribed format for the question of the ballot?

Answer: Yes. Legislation specifies how the question must be presented on the ballot:

Ballot Question. - The form of the question to be presented on a ballot for a special election concerning the levy of the tax authorized by this Article shall be: [] FOR [] AGAINST Local sales and use tax at the rate of 1-quarter% (0.25%) in addition to all other State and local sales and use taxes."

Note: The sale tax amount is set at a rate of .25%.

Question: When is the earliest the sales tax will become effective if the Board of County Commissioners levies the sales tax via resolution following a successful referendum?

Answer: The sales tax may become effective on the first day of any calendar quarter so long as the county gives the Secretary of Revenue at least 90 days' advance notice. For example, if a referendum is held in November during the general election and passes, the earliest a county could begin collecting the revenue would be April one of the following year, provided it adopts a resolution levying the tax and forwards it to the Department of Revenue prior to December 31.

Question: If the voters pass the referendum for the sales tax, what happens next?

Answer: If the Board of Commissioners wishes to levy the tax, it must provide 10 days public notice of its intent to adopt a resolution to levy the tax. After it adopts the resolution, it must send a certified copy of the resolution along with a certified copy of the election results of the referendum to the Department of Revenue. The DoR's address is:

The Association has prepared a model resolution PDF for a successful sales tax referenda.

Question: Are there restrictions on the use of the revenues?

Answer: No. The sales tax is not restricted or earmarked and can therefore be used for any allowed use by

Question: If the referendum fails, can a county hold a subsequent referendum on the same question?

Answer: There are no restrictions on resubmitting the sales tax option to the voters again after an unsuccessful referendum.

Question: Can a county spend public money educating citizens on issues related to the referendum?

Answer: Yes. Similar to an election for a general obligation bond, a county may spend money to educate the public on issues related to the sales tax referendum. However, a county may not spend money advocating for or against the sales tax.

Question: Can members of a county board of commissioners actively promote the passage of the referendum? Answer: Yes. The board of commissioners may approve resolutions in support of the passage of a referendum for the sales tax. A county commissioner may publicly endorse and support the sales tax. A county may not reimburse any expenses incurred by an elected official while the official is advocating either for or against the tax measure.

Question: Does the sales tax apply to unprepared food or gas?

Answer: No. The local-option sales tax does not apply to unprepared food (i.e. groceries) or gas purchases. There is no local sales tax on gas purchases.

As with any local legal matter, we ask that you consult with your county attorney and county board of elections as you consider these local referendum options.

Local Option Sales Tax Referenda

in 2007 legislation passed by the N.C. General Assembly gave to counties a local-option, quarter-cent sales lax (G.S. 105-535), which must be approved by voters in a referendum before it can be adopted by a county.

Commissioner Phelps asked why is the SRO in Roper is so high. All others are under. Mr. Potter explained that the County is paying for part of that SRO.

Commissioner Phelps said why there is constantly a budget amendment for Communications. Do they not have enough staff? Mr. Potter said the County has this issue in Communications and Detention. They do have vacancies and they spend more on overtime and/or part time employees. Commissioner Johnson asked where the funding comes from for the Courthouse Security Guards. Mr. Potter said Ms. Keyes signs off on it but comes out of Facilities/Buildings budget since it is a contracted service for courthouse security.

Commissioner Phelps said would like additional information before moving money for a computer in Recreation on BT#2018-27.

<u>Commissioner Walker made a motion to approve the BA-#2018-24, 25 and 26 as presented. Commissioner Phelps seconded, motion passed unanimously.</u>

Mr. Potter said that he has already approved BT#2018-27...it is under the threshold that the Commissioners have given him permission to approve. He is just bringing it to the Board for information.

Commissioner Phelps made a motion to rescind Mr. Potter's BT#2018-27 of \$1,000 in the Recreation Department. Commissioner Riddick seconded. Commissioner Phelps and Riddick voted aye. Chair Johnson and Commissioner Walker voted nay. Motion died as a result of a tie.

<u>Commissioner Phelps made a motion to approve the Sheriff's portion of BT#2018-27, Commissioner Walker seconded, motion passed unanimously.</u>

OTHER ITEMS BY CHAIRPERSON, COMMISSIONERS, COUNTY MANAGER/ATTORNEY OR CLERK:

Mr. Potter said the auditors contacted Ms. Dixon and said they will be onsite next Thursday and Friday for their final field work. Mr. Potter said the LGC has been made aware that the County's audit will be late.

Mr. Potter told the Commissioners about various leaks from the recent snowstorms that left broken pipes. The most extensive damage was at BCCC WCC in the kitchen area because of the overhead pipes. The kitchen and restrooms floor and ceiling tiles will need to be replaced. There were some water issues in the building occupied by Dream Providers. One other building was damaged; however, it looked like it was done intentionally.

Mr. Potter said he was contacted by the Plymouth Town Manager to set up a joint meeting with the Board sometime this year. Also, they discussed the boundary issue behind the Plymouth Police Station.

Mr. Potter referenced property at the corner of Madison and East 3rd street. A citizen would like to donate property this property to the County. DSS said it would make an excellent spot for the Riverlight Transit vehicles to park and DSS may have funds for fencing in this area.

Commissioner Phelps made a motion to go into Closed Session pursuant to NCGS §143-318.11 (a)(3) (attorney-client privilege) and to NCGS §143-318.11 (a)(6) (personnel). Commissioner Walker seconded, motion carried unanimously.

Back in Open Session, Mr. Potter said by January 17th, 2018, the County will have 3 vacancies in our EMS system. Mr. Coccaro will have to start taking a shift. Mr. Coccaro said he is continuing to recruit people. There doesn't seem to be enough people who want to work in Washington County. During a shift, there may be an ambulance that doesn't have a paramedic on it. Mr. Potter said this problem is so large that we all have to work together to figure out how to fix it. Mr. Potter asked the Board what direction they want management to go in to fix this issue. The County is either going to have to put more money into the system or reduce services.

Mr. Coccaro said he and Mr. Potter need to do a lot of number crunching. Some options Mr. Coccaro provided are:

> change shift model

Chair

- > go to a QRV system
- > Shut a truck down if you can't staff it
- ➤ Drop or reduce level—can say we don't want to be a paramedic county
- > See if we can adjust the Tyrrell County contract (doesn't recommend it)
- ➤ Have to pay people better to get them to Washington County

Mr. Coccaro said Washington County EMS has a scheduling problem and a stationing problem partly because of the geography of the County.

Commissioner Phelps asked Mr. Potter how many hours Ms. O'Neill works with Ms. Keyes. Mr. Potter stated approximately 20 hours a week are spent of Ms. O'Neill's time with Ms. Keyes. Commissioner Phelps said Ms. O'Neill should be working only with EMS at this time since EMS has a shortage of paramedics. Mr. Potter said if EMS has to do a "mandatory recall" it would be for more folks than just for Ms. O'Neill.

At 8:40 PM, with no further business to discuss, Commissioner Phelps made a motion to recess the meeting to January 30, 2018_at 3:00 pm in the Commissioners' Room.

Commissioner Riddick seconded, motion carried unanimously.
