RESOLUTION 2024-033

ESTABLISHING CONTINUITY OF OPERATIONS DURING DECLARED STATES OF EMERGENCY OR THE UNAVAILABILITY OR ABSENCE OF THE COUNTY MANAGER

WHEREAS, in light of recent events, including without limitation the impact of the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) on county services and operations, the potentially increasing severity of tropical storm/hurricane related events, and the recent addition of an Assistant County Manager position; the County Manager recommends that the Board of Commissioners update certain procedures previously established pursuant to Resolution RESO 2020-010 to maintain the appropriate official chain of command and continuity of county operations during potential emergency situations; and

WHEREAS, the intent of such procedures is to better insure the ongoing provision of continuous and uninterrupted county services and operations during certain potential emergency situations, and to mitigate and reduce the risks of their potential disruption which may otherwise result in the absence of such procedures; and

WHEREAS, after careful consideration, the Board of Commissioners now desires to update such procedures by adopting this resolution.

NOW THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF WASHINGTON COUNTY HEREBY RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That during a declared State of Emergency for Washington County:
 - a. The County Manager and/or County Finance Officer shall have the authority to temporarily suspend compliance with any local county purchasing policies that may otherwise have been adopted, or which are in effect during the period of any declared state of emergency.

- i. This authority may be exercised retroactively to coincide with the initial day of the declared state of emergency.
- ii. This authority should only be exercised if doing so is deemed by the County Manager or County Finance Officer to be in the best interest of the County with respect to being able to more effectively respond to any emergency situation giving rise to the declared state of emergency, or to more freely qualify for or comply with applicable FEMA reimbursement program requirements.
- iii. Nothing herein relieves or removes the continuing obligation to adhere to all applicable state and federal purchasing and procurement rules, regulations, or laws.
- 2. That unless otherwise directed by the Board of Commissioners, during any period in which the County Manager is unable to reasonably exercise the duties and powers of that position for any reason, the Assistant County Manager (or in the absence thereof, the County Finance Officer) is hereby appointed and authorized to act in their place as "Acting County Manager" and shall be empowered when acting in such capacity to exercise any and all of the duties and powers conferred upon the position of County Manager by law, or by the Board of Commissioners.
 - a. The intent of this provision is to establish a clear and direct successive chain of command by appointing the Assistant County Manager first, and then the County Finance Officer second, as the default successors to the duties, powers, and authority of the County Manager position if the County Manager is unable to reasonably perform the duties and powers of that position for any reason.
 - b. However, the Assistant County Manager or County Finance Officer should carefully consider all available information and the circumstances of each situation giving rise to their being called upon to potentially serve in the capacity of Acting County Manager before exercising any authority granted under this provision in that capacity. Such authority should only be exercised during emergency situations where immediate action is reasonably required to preserve and protect public safety and welfare, or to prevent an unreasonable disruption in county services or operations that might otherwise result from a delay in decision making caused by waiting on the availability of the actual County Manager, or the convening of the Board of Commissioners to appoint an Interim County Manager depending upon the circumstances.
 - c. Any action taken by the Assistant County Manager or County Finance Officer in their capacity as Acting County Manager hereunder shall be clearly communicated as such to all recipients. Any and all documents signed in such capacity shall clearly note the same. The Assistant County Manager and County Finance Officer should take reasonable steps to keep the County Manager and Board of Commissioners advised of any such actions, and a full detailed accounting thereof shall be made to the County Manager or Board of Commissioners upon their request.
 - d. Nothing herein prevents the Board of Commissioners from appointing a different person to serve as acting, interim, or permanent County Manager at any time.

SUMMARY EXPLANATION:

As is required by North Carolina General Statute §153A-52.1, time has been allotted for comments from the public.

Public Comment Statements

In December of 2015, the Washington County Board of Commissioners adopted a public comment period. Essentially this policy said that a public comment period shall be set aside at the beginning of each regular monthly Commissioners and it shall be limited to a maximum of thirty (30) minutes.

Additionally this policy stated that <u>all speakers are required to sign up prior to the meeting</u> at which they wish to speak. The signup sheet must be on the podium 30 mins prior to the meeting. Each speaker shall clearly write their name, address, and the topic upon which they wish to speak on the signup sheet.

This board adopted rules that must be followed. Some of the high points of those rules, which I wish to remind the public is:

- 1. Speakers shall be acknowledged by the Board Chairperson.
- 2. Speakers shall address the Board from the lectern at the front of the room, and begin their remarks by stating their name and address.
- 3. Public comment is not intended to require any Board or staff members to answer any impromptu questions or engage in debate. Speakers shall address all remarks to the Board as a body, and not to any individual board or staff members. Discussions between speakers and members of the audience shall not be allowed.
- 4. Speakers shall be courteous in their language and presentations, and shall not use profanity, racial slurs, or make any obscene remarks, nor engage in any personal attacks of commissioners.
- 5. Speakers shall have a maximum of three (3) to five (5) minutes to make their remarks depending on the number of speakers and topics. The Chairperson may limit the number of speakers allowed to make substantially similar comments with respect to the same topic.
- 6. Speakers who have prepared written remarks or supporting documents are encouraged to leave a copy of such remarks and documents with the County Clerk.
- 7. Speakers shall not discuss any of the following: matters which are the subject of public hearings set for the same meeting; matters which are closed session matters, including without limitation matters within the attorney-client privilege, anticipated or pending litigation, personnel, property acquisition, and matters which are made confidential by law.

PURPOSE: To review and adopt the amended/restated Article VII of the Washington County Zoning Ordinance

BACKGROUND:

The main changes involve:

- Greater specificity in defining types of signs, including electronic and digital signs.
- Stricter rules for certain residential and commercial areas.
- Updates to permit requirements and processes, emphasizing safety and aesthetics.
- A more structured approach to appeals, with reference to related zoning articles.

Purpose and Intent: Unchanged.

Definitions

- "Flat sign" has been removed. Minor updates are made to "Directional Signs" and "Internally Illuminated Signs."
- Additional language for the Planning Coordinator has been added, referring to a different article in the zoning ordinance.

Sign Permit Requirements

• This section has been moved to follow section B "Definitions", rather than precede it; additionally, the article now provides insight on how to apply for a sign permit to the planning board.

Prohibited Signs

Language has been simplified, and directory signs are now prohibited in residential areas (except for churches).
 Some new restrictions on pole signs in residential areas and stricter rules on projecting signs over public property have been introduced.

Permitted Signs for Identification in a Residential Zone

• See the previous ordinance's section K "Permitted Signs for all Residential Uses"; otherwise, no functional changes (though sections were re-ordered for clarity).

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Permitted Signs for Commercial Use

• See the previous ordinance's section L "Permitted Signs for Commercial Use".

Permitted Signs for Commercial and Corridor Zones

- See the previous ordinance's section M "Permitted Signs for Manufacturing and Industrial Use." Language has been heavily simplified, but function is identical.
- This section also contains the new rules for LCD/LED/Projection signs; the new ordinance generally prohibits
 these where possible, with limited exceptions for commercial buildings, and new regulations for window signs,
 sign materials, and gas station island signs.

Outdoor Advertising Signs

• Adapted from the previous ordinance's section N "Outdoor Advertising Signs", though it provides additional clarity on the need to acquire electrical installation/construction permits as required by state law.

Exempt Signs

- Real estate, instructional signs, and signs advertising agricultural products are exempt from all provisions of the new ordinance (in addition to the previous list).
- It also incorporates the previous ordinance's section I "Nonconforming Signs".

Appeals and Remedies, Enforcement

• The new ordinance creates a process by which the Planning Board and Coordinator can better "increase the flexibility" of the ordinance, and clarifies that enforcement comes from the County Manager and Planning Coordinator.

Entirely Removed Sections

- The old ordinance section D "General Requirements for All Signs" has been removed.
- The old ordinance section E "Calculation of Sign Area" has been removed.
 - Functionally, these two sections would be included as part of the application process laid out in the new "Sign Permits Requirement" section.
- The old ordinance section G "Temporary Signs" has been removed.
- The old ordinance section J "Abandoned Signs" has been removed.
 - Aside from the new requirements around LCD/LED/Projection signs, this is the only policy difference
 between the two documents. These rules were covered by a combination of the Outdoor Advertising
 Control Act, the new appeals process and the sign permit requirements. Please consult the Planning
 Department for more details.

RECOMMENDATION(S):

1. VOTE: To approve the amendments/restatement of Article VII of the Washington County Zoning Ordinance as presented.

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A. Purpose and Intent:

Enforcement

Washington County, North Carolina

The purpose of this article is to regulate the size, location, height and construction of signs for public observance; to protect the public health, safety, convenience and general welfare; to facilitate the creation of a convenient, attractive and harmonious community, to protect property values and to further economic development objectives of Washington County. Signs subject to these regulations include all exterior signs and permanent interior window signs which are placed for exterior observance. To these ends, these regulations are intended to promote signs which are:

- 1. An enhancement to the appearance of the County's corridors, residential neighborhoods and business areas;
- 2. Legible and appropriate to the activity to which they pertain;
- 3. Constructed and maintained in a structurally sound and attractive condition; and
- 4. Limited to the specific use or business that is in operation on the premises.

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B. Sign Permit Requirement:

Except as provided hereinafter, no sign shall be erected, installed, used, altered, painted, relocated, replaced or reconstructed until a Sign Permit has been issued by the Planning Coordinator.

C. Sign Definitions:

For the purpose of this <u>aA</u>rticle, <u>certain</u> terms and words pertaining to signs are hereby defined.:

- 1. Awning Sign. A sign painted or printed on, attached flat or sewn onto valance or body of any awning.
- 2. Billboard Sign. A sign used as an outdoor display for the purpose of advertising or promoting a business, service, activity or products, which is not located on the premises on which a sign is situated. Also referred to as Outdoor Advertising Sign.
- 3. Building Mounted Sign. A sign attached to, painted on, inscribed upon or deriving its major support from a building, including a wall sign, a projecting sign, a canopy sign, a marquee or an awning sign.
- 4. Bulletin Board. A sign that identifies an institution or organization on the premises of which it is located and that contains the name of the institution or organization, the names of individuals connected with it and general announcements of events or activities occurring at the institution or similar message.
- 5. Canopy Sign. A sign attached to or displayed on a canopy. For the purpose of this Article, a canopy is a permanent, roof-like structure of rigid materials either supported by and extending from a building or free-standing, including a marquee.
- 6. Changeable Copy Sign. A sign or part of a sign that is designed so that characters, letters or illustrations can be changed or rearranged without altering the face or surface of the sign.
- 7. Detached Sign. See Freestanding Sign.
- 8. Directional Sign. An on-premises sign giving directions, instructions, and/or facility information, but containing no advertising copy (i.e. parking, exit or entrance signs).
- 98. Directory Sign. A subsidiary sign listing the names, uses or location of various businesses conducted within a building or group of buildings.
- 109. Double-Faced Sign. A sign with two (2) parallel, or nearly parallel, faces, back to back, and located no more than 24 inches from each other.
- 4110. Externally Illuminated Sign. A sign which does not produce artificial light from within itself but which is opaque and illuminated by spotlights or floodlights not a part of or attached to the sign itself.
- 1211. Freestanding Sign. A sign, supported by one (1) or more columns, uprights or braces, in or upon the ground, but not attached to any building. A sign attached to a flat surface not a part of the building, such as a fence or wall, shall be considered a

- freestanding sign. A monument sign, as defined herein below, shall also be considered a freestanding sign.
- Flashing Sign. An illuminated sign on which the artificial or reflected light is not maintained stationary and constant in intensity and color at all times when in use.
- 14. Flat Sign. See Wall Sign.
 - 1513. Informational Sign. A sign of a public or quasi-public nature which identifies or locates a hospital, public building, college, university, public parking area, historic area, major tourist attraction, public recreation area or similar public or quasi-public activity, which shall be approved on a case-by-case basis by the Planning Coordinator.
 - 1614. Internally Illuminated Sign. Any sign designed to radiate artificial light from within itself.
 - 4715. Marquee. A permanent structure, awning or canopy projecting beyond a building wall at an entrance to a building or extending along and projecting beyond the building's wall and generally designed and constructed to provide protection against the weather.
 - 1816. Monument Sign. A ground mounted sign which is mounted on a contiguous base having a minimum width of at least ninety percent (90%) of the sign width and its supporting structure and not attached to any building.
 - 1917. Off Premises Directional Sign. A sign which is not located on the same premises as the use to which it refers and which is intended to provide information as to the id entity and location of use, but which does not otherwise qualify as an advertising sign.
 - 2018. Outdoor Advertising Sign. A freestanding or building mounted sign which bears a message which does not pertain to the use of the property, where the sign is located, and which does not identify the place of business, if any, where the sign is located as the purveyor of merchandise or services upon the property. Outdoor advertising signs may also be referred to as "billboards" or "poster panels", but such signs shall not be interpreted to mean informational signs allowed by this Article.
 - 19. Planning Coordinator. Reference Article 9 of the Washington County Zoning Ordinance for Planning Coordinator definitions and duties.
 - 2120. Projecting Sign. A sign which is attached and perpendicular to the face of a wall of a building and which extends eighteen (18) inches or more from the building wall or face.
 - 2221. Real Estate Sign. A temporary sign which advertises the sale, lease, rental or display of the lot or building upon which such sign is displayed.
 - 2322. Sign. Any writing, letter work or numeral, pictorial presentation, illustration or decoration, emblem, device, symbol or trademark, flag, banner, pennant or any other device, figure or character which is employed to announce, direct attention to, identify, or make known, and which is visible from a public street or sidewalk or area of public congregation.
 - 2423. Sign Area. That area which outlines the outer extremities of all letters, figures, characters and delineations, or within an area including the outer extremities of the framework or background of the sign, whichever includes the larger area. The support for the sign background, whether it be columns, a pylon, or a building or part thereof, shall

- not be included in the sign area. The area of a cylindrical or spherical sign shall be computed by multiplying the diameter of the cylinder by the height of the sign.
- 2524. Street Frontage. The entire length of that part of a lot that fronts on a public street, as defined by the plat of record for the subject lot.
- 2625. Wall Sign. A building mounted sign which is attached to, painted on, inscribed upon, or deriving its major support from a wall and which projects less than twelve (12) inches from the wall.
- 2726. Window Sign. A sign painted onto or physically affixed to a building window including upper floor windows and the glazing of doors or signs legible from any vehicular public right-of-way through a building window, limited to 10ten percent (10%) of the total glass area of the window in which they are placed.

DC. General Sign Permit Requirements: for All Signs:

The following regulations shall apply generally to all signs and are in addition to the regulations that apply to signs for all uses:

- 1. Responsibility: The owner and/or tenant of the premises and the owner and/or erector of the sign shall be held responsible for any violation of these regulations.
 - 1.2. Removal: No sign shall be erected, installed, used, altered, relocated, replaced or reconstructed until a sign permit has been issued by Tthe Planning Coordinator. shall remove or cause to be removed any sign erected or maintained in conflict with these regulations if the owner or lessee of either the site or the sign fails to correct the violation within 30 days after receiving written notice of violation from
 - * Freestanding signs require a permit to be issued by the Department of Transportation (DOT) before the Planning Coordinator-may issue a permit.
 - 2.3. Landscaping: A landscaped planting area To obtain a permit, the following information shall be provided aroundto the base of any freestanding or detached sign. Washington County Planning Office:

The planting area shall contain 2 times the area of the sign, be a minimum of 4 feet in width, be protected from vehicular encroachment and be landscaped with a combination of low-growing shrubs and ground covers (other than grass).

- 4. Illumination standards: Externally illuminated signs shall be illuminated only by a steady, stationary, light source directed only at the sign without causing glare for motorists and pedestrians or illumination spill over on neighboring properties. Internally illuminated signs, where permitted, shall be illuminated only by a steady, stationary, light source internal to the sign without causing glare for motorists and pedestrians or illumination spill over on neighboring properties.
 - 5. Sight distance: The land adjoining a street intersection is to be kept clear of obstructions between three (3) and seven (7) feet above the ground to protect the visibility and safety of motorists and pedestrians. The impact of a. A detailed

E. Calculation of Sign Area

- 1. Sign area computations: The sign area shall be calculated as the entire area within a single continuous perimeter, and a single plane, composed of a square, circle, rectangle or other geometric figure that encloses the extreme limits of the sign's message, background and trim, and including all letters, figures, graphics or other elements of the sign.
- 2. Sign faces calculated: The sign area shall be calculated based upon the maximum number of faces viewable for any single ground position, as follows:
- a. Single faced sign: one face counted.
- b. Double faced sign: each face counted.
- c. "V" sign with and angle of 45 degree or greater: two faces counted.
- d. Three dimensional sign: projected to single flat planes, all visible sign faces counted.
- e. Cylindrical sign: the sign area on each side of the cylinder shall be calculated by multiplying the height of the cylinder by the diameter of the cylinder.
- 3. Computations of sign height

The dimension from the top of any point on a sign, including its support structure, of any sign erected within thirty (30) feet of a street shall be the distance from the grade level of the nearest curb of the street to the top of the sign or sign structure, whichever is greater. The height of all signs farther than thirty (30) feet from a street shall be the distance from the grade level where the sign is erected to the top of the sign or sign structure whichever is greater.

F. Exempt Signs:

The following signs are exempted from the provisions of this article and may be erected or constructed without a permit but in accordance with the structural and safety requirements of the building code.

- 1. Traffic Signs and Signals. Signs erected and maintained pursuant to and in discharge of any federal, state or county government function, or as may be required by law.
- 2. Changing of message content. Changing a copy on a bulletin board, poster board, display encasement, marquee or changeable copy sign.

- 3. Temporary real estate signs (Non-illuminated). Temporary, non-illuminated real estate signs advertising real estate for sale or lease shall be exempt from obtaining a sign permit.
- 4. Identifying sign for official state automobile inspection stations (Non-illuminated). Non-illuminated signs identifying official state automobile inspection stations, provided that such signs shall not exceed 10 square feet in area and shall be limited to one sign for each street frontage.
- 5. Temporary, non-illuminated construction signs. Temporary non-illuminated signs not more than 32 square feet in area, erected in connection with new construction work.
- 6. Signs warning trespassers (Non-illuminated). Non-illuminated signs warning trespassers or announcing property as posted, without limitations on number or placement, limited in area to two square feet.
- 7. Political signs: Sign applicable to federal, state or local elections are permitted as long as, the area of such sign shall-not exceed eight (8) square feet and such signs may be erected no earlier than thirty (30) days prior to the date of the election and shall be removed no later than seven (7) days after the election.
- 8. Civie/charitable signs: Signs advertising activities of civie/charitable organizations may be creeted on any property, as long as one side of such sign shall not exceed sixteen (16) square feet, and such signs may be creeted no earlier than four (4) weeks prior to the date of the activity and shall be removed no later than one (1) week after the completion of the activity.
- 9. The display of a national, state or municipal flag: The display of a government flag not exceeding 72 square feet in area per side.
- 10. Memorial tablets and historic markers: Tablets or markers erected or approved by the State of North Carolina or Washington County.
- 11. Seasonal displays and decorations which do not advertise a product or service: Displays or decorations that are of a patriotic, religious or civic character on private property, not advertising a product or service, not displayed for a period to exceed 30 days.
- 12. Handicapped parking space sign: Signs not exceeding two (2) square feet in area denoting reserved parking spaces for handicapped motorists.

G. Temporary Signs

- c. After review and approval of the permit application, the Planning Coordinator shall determine the appropriate fee based on the budgeted fee schedule approved by the Washington County Board of Commissioners. Fees are based on the area of all visible sides of the sign, including trim area.
- d. Upon payment of the sign permit fee, the permit shall be issued, and work can commence.

e. Sign permit fees, according to the annual budget, can be found below. For more information, please reference the Building Inspection and Zoning Permits Fee Schedule, Section 14.

_	Over 100 square feet	\$120.00
_	Electricity to sign	\$75.00

The following signs and displays may be erected for a period not to exceed thirty(30) days.3. Should the Planning Coordinator determine the proposed sign is not in accordance with this Ordinance, the owner of the business or property may apply to the Planning Board for a plan review. If a temporary sign is not removed at the expiration of the time limitation, The Planning Board, along with the Planning Coordinator may remove the sign or display and charge the cost of the removal to the individual applicant or responsible enterprise., after consideration of design, location, construction, method of operation, and the effect on nearby property, will determine if adverse effects can be avoided by the imposition of any special requirements or conditions attached to the sign permit.

- 1. Civic and cultural event sign. Signs or banners not exceeding 32 square feet advertising a special civic or cultural event such as a fair, exposition, play, concert or meeting, sponsored by a governmental, civic or charitable organization.
- 2. Seasonal decorative commercial sign. Special decorative signs or displays for commercial purposes on a commercial, industrial or manufacturing use property, where such sales are permitted, used for holidays and other seasonal events.
- 3. Commercial promotional signs or banners. Special sales promotion displays on any commercial, industrial or manufacturing use property, including displays incidental to the opening of a new business and special one-time auctions of real or personal property in estate or bankruptcy sales.
- 4. Public auction/sales signs (Non-illuminated): Non-illuminated signs advertising public auctions or sales, as differentiated from signs advertising established commercial enterprises, real estate sales and home/garage/yard sales, may be erected on any commercial, industrial or manufacturing use property.
 - 5. Temporary portable sign. Temporary portable signs, such as "A-frame" signs, not exceeding 32 square feet in area, which are intended to identify or display information pertaining to an establishment for which permanent free-standing signage is on orderIf no remedy can be concluded, see Section I of this Ordinance for appeal and remedy to the Zoning Ordinance.

HD. Prohibited Signs:

1. Roof sign and roof projecting sign. Signs No sign which is not an integral part of the building design shall be fastened to and supported by or on the roof of a building and

- no projecting sign shall extend over or above the roof line or parapet wall of a building.
- 2. Sign causing visual confusion. No sign shall be constructed, erected, or operated or maintained which is so located and soor illuminated as towhich provide a background of colored lights blending with traffic signal lights, which may confuse a-motorists. when viewed from normal approaching position of a vehicle at a distance of 25 to 300 feet.
- 2. Roof signs to be fastened to or supported by any roof structure.
- 3. Tree, utility pole and other related signs. No sign3. Any and all signs, except official notices of Washington County, shall be attached to trees, utility poles, public property, improvements within public rights of way or on any unapproved supporting structure.
- 4. <u>SAny sign projecting over a public right of way.right-of-way.</u> No signs shall project over public right-of-way without express permission of the Planning Board in conjunction with the approval of a site plan, except for permitted flat signs which may project not more than 18 inches.
- I. Nonconforming Signs:

Any sign which was in existence at the time of the effective date of these regulations and which does not conform to the provisions herein, shall be deemed a lawful nonconforming sign, and may remain, subject to the following:

- 1. A nonconforming sign must be maintained in good repair and condition.
- 2. Nonconforming signs may not be enlarged, extended, modified, reconstructed or structurally altered except in accordance with this article.
- No nonconforming sign shall be moved on the same lot or building or to another lot or building unless the sign as relocated is modified to comply with all requirements of this article.

J. Abandoned Signs:

A sign, including its supporting structure or brackets, shall be removed by the owner or lessee of the premises upon which the sign is located when the business it advertises is no longer on the premises. Such sign, if not removed within sixty (60) days from the termination of occupancy by such business shall be considered to be in violation of this section, and the Planning Coordinator may cause the abandoned sign to be removed at the owner's expense.

5. Pole signs on any residential property.

6. Directory signs are prohibited in all residential zones, except Churches.

KE. Permitted Signs for all Identification in a Residential Uses: Zone: The following non-illuminated or externally illuminated signs shall be permitted in conjunction with residential uses located within the County:

1. Freestanding Signs:

All freestanding signs for these uses zones shall have a maximum height of eight (8) feet and shall not be located within five (5) feet of any public street right-of-way, or property line and shall not be located within ten (10) feet of any alley, private street, or driveway intersecting a public or private street:

- a. Church, iInstitutional, or eCivic uUse identification.— One (1) freestanding monument sign, limited to thirty two (32) square feet, in area for a church bulletin board or identifying a church, school, park, playground, library, museum, or other public or semiquasi-public use, recreational use or club, shall be permitted. An additional area not exceeding forty-four (44) square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base for such sign and which are, and not a part of the message portion of the sign. Pole signs are prohibited.
- b. Subdivision, project, nursing home or day care facility identification sign.b.

 Entrance to Subdivisions or Facilities One (1) freestanding monument sign per street entrance identifying a single-family detached residential subdivision, or manufactured nursing home, daycare, facility, or mobile home park, limited in area to twenty to a maximum of four (244) square feet, shall be permitted feet by eight (8) feet. Two (2) such signs are may be permitted if erected in conjunction with a median (formal gateway entrance) and if approved as part of the plan of development or subdivision application in the original site plan. An additional area not exceeding thirty two (32) square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base for such sign and which are not part of the message portion of the sign. Pole signs are prohibited.
- c. Bed and bBreakfast identification sign. One (1) One freestanding sign, not exceeding twelve (12) square feet in area identifying a bed and breakfast, inn, or tourist home shall be permitted is allowed. An additional area not exceeding sixteen (of 16) square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base for such sign and which are, and not a part of the message portion. of the sign.
- 2. Building Mounted Signs:

Multi-family building identification sign. used to identify the address only. One or more signs Size is limited in aggregate area to ten (10) square feet, to identify the building address, shall be permitted.

3. Directory Signs:

Church directories. Directory signs are not permitted on all Allowed only for places of Worship in a residential uses, except for directories at churches and places of worship. Such directory signs shall not to exceed sixteen (16) square feet, in area. with An additional area not exceeding twenty-four (24) square 24 feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base for such sign and which are not a part of the message portion of the sign.area.

4. Additional Regulations.

Sign Height and Setback. All freestanding signs for these uses shall have a maximum height of eight (8) feet and shall not be located within five (5) feet of any public street right-of-way, or property line and shall not be located within ten (10) feet of any alley, private street or driveway intersecting a public or private street.

LF. Permitted Signs for Commercial Uses.:

The following accessory illuminated or non-illuminated signs shall be permitted for commercial uses:

1. Freestanding Signs:

- a. Business identification sign for a single occupant commercial building. One (1) freestanding or monument sign for identification of a single business establishment shall be permitted. limited to a Such sign shall be limited in area to thirty two (32) square feet area. An additional area not exceeding forty-four (44) square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base for such sign and which and are not part of the message portion. of the sign.
- b. Business identification sign for a group of two (2) or more contiguous stores or businesses per building and less than 60,000 gross leasable square feet. Sign area shall be combined into a single freestanding or monument sign advertising all businesses on the premises. The combined sign shall not exceed forty-eight (48) square feet in area. An additional area not exceeding sixty four (64) square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base for such sign, and which are not part of the message portion of the sign.
- <u>.</u> e.Business identification sign for a group of two or more contiguous stores or businesses per building and more than 60,000 gross leasable square feet.

Permitted sign area shall be combined into a single freestanding or monument sign advertising all businesses on the premises. The combined sign shall not exceed forty eight (64) square feet in area. An additional area not exceeding eighty- five (85) square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base for such sign and which are not part of the message portion of the sign.

d. Directional signs. Directional signs limited in area to four (4) square feet shall be permitted as accessory signs and not included in any computation of sign area. One per entrance or exit not to exceed three (3) feet in height nor located within five (5) feet of any street right-of-way line.

2. Building Mounted Signs:

- a. Wall signs. One (1) sign per Wall signs shall be permitted for each establishment on the premises. The combined sign area of wall, projecting, canopy, awning and marquee signs shall be limited to two (2) square foot of sign per linear foot of building frontage.
- b. Projecting signs. One projecting sign shall be permitted for each establishment on the premises. The combined sign area of wall, projectiong, canopy, awning, andor mMarquee signs shallwill be limited to two (2) square footfeet of sign per linear foot of building frontage. Additionally each side of a projecting sign must be counted towards the total allowable sign area.

e. Awning, canopy or marquee signs. Awning, canopy or marquee signs shall be permitted for each establishment on the premises. The combined sign area of wall, projecting, canopy, awning and marquee signs shall be limited to two (2) square foot of sign per linear foot of building frontage.

33. Directory Signs:

- a. Business directory for a single occupant commercial building. One directory (1) directional sign is allowed per commercial building. Such directory signs shall not exceed sixteen (16) square feet in area. Wwhen the directory is freestanding, anAn additional area not exceeding twenty-four (24) square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which may serve as support or base for such sign and which are so long as it shall not be part of the message portion of the sign.
- b. Business directory for a group of two (2) or more contiguous stores or businesses per building and less than 60,000 gross leasable square feet.— One (1) directory sign is allowed. Such directory signs shall not to exceed twenty four (24) square feet in area. When a directory is free standing, an additional area not exceeding thirty-six (36) square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base for such sign and which areso long as it shall not be part of the message portion of the sign.

e4. Business directory for a group of two or more contiguous stores or businesses per building and more than 60,000 gross leasable square feet. Electronic, Illuminated, and Digital Signs

One directory sign is allowed.

Signs that use technologies such as LCD, LED and Projection to display content such as digital images, video, streaming media, and information. Digital signs are prohibited except for the following:

- a. Attached, as a wall sign, not exceeding 150 square feet in area, per sign, to a civic building where the civic building contains one (1) or more places of public assembly having a single-room seating capacity of no less than 1,000. No more than one (1) digital sign shall be permitted on a building façade facing the same public street.
- b. As a ground sign, not exceeding 250 square feet in area erected on a supporting structure, mast, post, or pole no more than 20 feet in height, on a lot containing (i) a civic building where the civic building contains one (1) or more places of public assembly; or (ii) an outdoor sports or entertainment facility having a seating capacity of no less than 2,000. No more than one (1) digital ground sign shall be permitted on a lot for each public street abutting the lot. Subject to the prior limitation, multiple signs may face the same public street. A ground sign is not attached, supported or suspended to or from any building or structure.
- c. Illuminated and digital signs shall be permitted to provide information such as time, temperature, date, and public announcements related to the business on-site only.
- Such directory signs shall i. Such signs shall be permitted only as part of an otherwise permitted sign or in conjunction with a permitted replacement of an existing sign, provided that the illuminated portion shall be at least 15% of the total square footage area of the sign and shall not exceed thirty two (32)35% of the total square feet infootage area. Whenof the directory is freestanding, an additional area not exceeding forty-eight (48) square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base for such sign and which are not part of the message portion of the sign. sign.
- ii. Messages on such signs shall not change more than seven (7) times per minute. In no case shall an animated presentation or animated change of frame be allowed.
- iii. Illuminated signs, should it be an addition to an existing sign, shall be comparable in composition, durability, and workmanship to the existing sign.
 - d. Digital signs shall not display any strobe lighting effects. For the purposes of this section, strobe lighting effects are bright flashes of light at a frequency of greater than 1Hz ((or one (1) flash of bright light per second)) where the brightness of the flashing light is two

- (2) times brighter than the signs illumination immediately prior to and subsequent to the strobe flash of light.
- e. Digital signs may not cause distraction or safety hazards to drivers. For the purposes of this section, digital signs shall not contain flashing lights (as outlined in F4d), bright illuminating colors that blend in with traffic lights (see D1) and may not be erected within 200 square feet of a roadway. Washington County reserves the right to declare a sign a distraction or safety concern, and therefore a violation of the Washington County Sign Ordinance, at any given time.
- f. Digital, electronic, and illuminated signs shall be limited to those lighted internally with glass or plastic faces bearing the advertisement; provided however, that exposed neon tubing and exposed incandescent or other bulbs not exceeding 15 watts each shall be permitted.
- g. The following materials shall be strictly prohibited in the use of any digital sign:
 - i. Flame (even as a source of light); and
 - ii. Exposed neon lighting.

5. Window Signs:

Signs displayed in windows of store fronts shall not cover greater than 10 percent of the total area of the windows of such store fronts and shall not count toward the total area permitted for wall signs.

46. Additional Regulations:

a. Individual free-standing signs for individual shopping center tenants shall not be permitted. For the purposes of this section, lawfully subdivided out parcels which have been depicted on the approved shopping center site plan shall be considered as separate parcels and may be signed as such.

b. Sign Materials:

- i. General. All signs shall be constructed of weather-resistant material designed expressly for signs.
- ii. Pole style ground signs. All pole style ground signs with support(s), upright(s), bracing(s), or framework(s) that include a pole encasement shall meet the following requirements with the exception of pole style ground signs for street signs, manufactured home park signs, interstate signs, and historical identification signs which shall be exempt from the requirements of this section.

- 1. The support(s), upright(s), bracing(s), or framework(s) shall be encased in an ornamental shell of stone, brick, ornamental metal, or similar materials, and shall be a minimum width of one-fourth of the width of the sign face.
- 2. The sign shall be constructed of an external support structure including stone, brick, ornamental metal, or similar materials, provided that the maximum number of supports, uprights,

bracings, or frameworks extending between grade and the base of the sign face shall not exceed two (2).

- bc. Gasoline pump island signs at gasoline sales establishments are subject to the following additional conditions:
- ai. Two (2) non-illuminated "self-serve" or "full-serve" signs per pump island not to exceed two (2) square feet each; and
- bii. One (1) fuel price or promotional information sign per fuel pump not to exceed two (2) square feet.

G. Permitted Signs for Manufacturing and Industrial Uses Commercial and Corridor Zones:

The following illuminated or non-illuminated signs shall be permitted for manufacturing and industrial uses commercial and corridor zones:

An additional area not exceeding ninety six (96) square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base for such sign and which are not part of the message portion. of the sign.

e. Businessi. All Combined sites in building iIdentification sign: for a commercial building with more than 100,000 gross leasable square feet. Permitted sign area shall be combined into a single freestanding sign advertising all businesses on the premises. The combined sign shall not exceed sixty four (64) square feet in area. 64 square feet with 133 feet of frame or support. An additional area not exceeding one hundred and thirty-three (133) square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base for such sign and which are not part of the message portion. of the sign.

d. d. Directional signs:

- i. Directional signs limited in area to eight (8) square feet shall be permitted as accessory signs and not included in any computation of sign area. One (1) sign per entrance or exit not to exceed eight (8) feet in height nor located within ten (10) feet of any street right-of-way line.
- 2.——Building Mounted Signs: Commercial and Corridor Zones:

a. Wall signs. One wall signs shall be permitted for each establishment on the premises. The combined sign area of wall, projecting, canopy, awning and marquee signs shall be limited to two (2) square foot of sign per linear foot of building frontage.

- b. Projecting signs. One projecting sign shall be permitted for each establishment on the premises.a. The combined sign area of One (1) sign per wall, projectiong, canopy, awning and marquee signs shall be limited to two (2) square foot of sign per linear foot of building frontage., or marquee is allowed and Additionally each side of a projecting sign must be counted towards the total allowable sign area.
- e. Awning, canopy or marquee signs. One awning, canopy or marquee sign shall be permitted for each establishment on the premises. The combined sign area of wall, projecting, canopy, awning and marquee signs shall be limited to two (2) square footfeet of sign per linear foot of building frontage is allowed.

NH. Outdoor Advertising Signs:

a.

All <u>oO</u>utdoor advertising signs will be erected in accordance with North Carolina Department of Transportation's <u>Regulations for the Control of Outdoor Advertising in North Carolina. Control Act. Permits for electrical service installation and construction based on the size of the sign are required.</u>

O. Special Sign Exceptions:

1. Cause for Exceptions: In order to provide for adjustments in the relative locations of signs of the same or different classifications, to promote the usefulness of these regulations as instruments of fact finding, interpretation, application and adjustment, and to supply the

necessary elasticity to their efficient operation, special sign exceptions may be granted by the Planning Board, as permitted by the terms of these regulations, after notice and a public hearing as provided for in these regulations. Towards this end, an owner of a property or business may apply to the Planning Board for a special sign exception permit.

2. Considerations for Exceptions: In considering an application for a special sign exception, the Planning Board, upon recommendation from the Planning Coordinator, shall give due regard to the specific guidelines and standards of this article and those listed elsewhere in these regulations, and in general to the nature and condition of adjacent uses and structures, and probable effect upon them of the proposed exception. The Planning Board shall also take into account the special characteristics, design, location, construction, method of operation, effect on nearby properties or any other aspects of the particular sign that may be proposed by the applicant.

I. Exempt Signs:

The following signs are exempted from the provisions of this article, and may be erected or constructed without a permit, but in accordance with the structural and safety requirements of the building code:

- 1. Traffic Ssigns and Ssignals. Signs erected and maintained pursuant to and in discharge of any federal, state, or county government function, or as may be required by law.
- 2. Changing of message content of changeable copy sign
- 3. Temporary, non-illuminated real estate sale or lease signs
- 4. Non-illuminated identifying sign for official state automobile inspection station not to exceed 10 square feet
- 5. Temporary, non-illuminated construction signs, not more than 32 square feet in area erected for new construction work
- 6. Non-illuminated No Trespassing signs, limited in area to two (2) square feet
- 7. Handicapped parking space sign not exceeding two (2) square feet in area
- 8. Political signs not exceeding eight (8) square feet and such signs may be, erected no earlier than thirty (30) days prior to the date of the election, and shall must be removed no later than seven (7) days after the election.
- 89. Civic/charitable signs: Signs Temporary advertising activities of civic/charitable organizations may be erected on any property, as long as one (1) side of such sign shall not exceed sixteen (16) square feet, and such signs may be erected no earlier than four (4) weeks prior to the date of the activity event, and shall must be removed no later than one
 - (1) week after the completion of the activity.
- 9.10. The dDisplay of a nNational, sState, or mMunicipal flag: The display of a government flag not exceeding 72 square feet in area per side.

- 1011. Memorial plaques such as tablets and historic markers: Tablets or markers erected or approved by the State of North Carolina or Washington County.
- 4112. Seasonal displays and decorations which do not advertise a product or service.
- 13. Identification signs: Not to exceed one (1) square foot in display area bearing only addresses or names of occupants of the premises and located on privately owned property.
- 14. Instructional signs: Erected on private property, not to exceed six (6) square feet in display area, erected strictly for the direction, safety or convenience of the public, including signs which identify restrooms, parking area entrances or exits, freight entrances, and similar devices, warning, danger, and no trespassing signs.
- 15. Real Estate signs: Signs pertaining to realty on the premises offered for sale or rent, not exceeding four (4) square feet in area and not illuminated. Such a sign may be placed not closer to a front property line than ten (10) feet. There shall be a limit of one (1) such sign per street frontage.
- 16. Signs advertising agricultural products produced on the premises: Not to exceed 16 square feet in area. There shall be a limit of one (1) such sign per street frontage.
- 17. Any and all signs erected before the implementation of this Article.

J. Appeals and Remedies:

3. Adverse Effect: If it should find, after the hearing, that the proposed sign: (a) will not adversely affect the community appearance, health, safety, or welfare of persons residing or working on the premises or in the neighborhood or corridor; (b) will not unreasonably impair the desired character of the property, corridor or adjacent properties; (c.) nor be incompatible with the Land Use Plan of Washington County, (d) nor be likely to reduce or impair the value of buildings or property in surrounding areas, (e.) but that such sign will be in substantial accordance with the general purpose and objectives of this article, then This Ordinance endeavors to create a process by which the Planning Coordinator, the Planning Board, upon consideration of recommendation from and the Board of Adjustments can address and implement zoning and land use in such a way as to reconcile the desires of future applicants with the health,

safety, and general welfare interests of the County. However, there may be special and unusual circumstances which arise within the administrative process that dictate that an application receives special attention in pursuit of fairness and sound planning practices. Therefore, variances to the application of this Ordinance which are outside the purview of the Planning Coordinator, may grant the exception and authorize the issuance, of a special sign exception permit. and

4. Conditions for Mitigation: In those instances where the Planning Board finds that the proposed sign may be likely to have an adverse effect as above, the Planning Board shall determine whether such effect can be avoided by the imposition of any special requirements or conditions with respect to location, design, construction, equipment, maintenance or operation, in addition to those expressly stipulated in this article, and may

grant a special sign exception subject to such reasonable conditions and limitations as the case may require, including but not limited to limitation as to size, type, color, graphic design, location or illumination., the Board of Adjustment is provided as a means of increasing the flexibility of the Ordinance. Please reference Article 10 of the Washington County Zoning Ordinance for appeal requirements and procedures.

5. Application Fee: An application fee to be submitted with any special sign exception application shall be established by the County.

K. Enforcement:

This Article will be enforced by the County Manager and Planning Coordinator. For more information about enforcement authority or procedures of this Article, please reference Article 9F and Article 9H of this Zoning Ordinance.

Article 7:

SIGNAGE REGULATIONS

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A. Purpose and Intent:

The purpose of this article is to regulate the size, location, height and construction of signs for public observance; to protect the public health, safety, convenience and general welfare; to facilitate the creation of a convenient, attractive and harmonious community, to protect property values and to further economic development objectives of Washington County. Signs subject to these regulations include all exterior signs and permanent interior window signs which are placed for exterior observance. To these ends, these regulations are intended to promote signs which are:

- 1. An enhancement to the appearance of the County's corridors, residential neighborhoods and business areas;
- 2. Legible and appropriate to the activity to which they pertain;
- 3. Constructed and maintained in a structurally sound and attractive condition;
- 4. Limited to the specific use or business that is in operation on the premises.

B. Definitions:

For the purpose of this Article, terms and words pertaining to signs are hereby defined:

- 1. Awning Sign. A sign painted or printed on, attached flat or sewn onto valance or body of any awning.
- 2. Billboard Sign. A sign used as an outdoor display for the purpose of advertising or promoting a business, service, activity or products, which is not located on the premises on which a sign is situated. Also referred to as Outdoor Advertising Sign.
- 3. Building Mounted Sign. A sign attached to, painted on, inscribed upon or deriving its major support from a building, including a wall sign, a projecting sign, a canopy sign, marquee or an awning sign.
- 4. Bulletin Board. A sign that identifies an institution or organization on the premises of which it is located and that contains the name of the institution or organization, the names of individuals connected with it and general announcements of events or activities occurring at the institution or similar message.
- 5. Canopy Sign. A sign attached to or displayed on a canopy. For the purpose of this Article, a canopy is a permanent, roof-like structure of rigid materials either supported by and extending from a building or free-standing, including a marquee.
- 6. Changeable Copy Sign. A sign or part of a sign that is designed so that characters, letters or illustrations can be changed or rearranged without altering the face or surface of the sign.

- 7. Directional Sign. An on-premises sign giving directions, instructions, and/or facility information, but containing no advertising copy (i.e. parking, exit or entrance signs).
- 8. Directory Sign. A subsidiary sign listing the names, uses or location of various businesses conducted within a building or group of buildings.
- 9. Double-Faced Sign. A sign with two (2) parallel, or nearly parallel, faces, back to back, and located no more than 24 inches from each other.
- 10. Externally Illuminated Sign. A sign which does not produce artificial light from within itself but which is opaque and illuminated by spotlights or floodlights not a part of or attached to the sign itself.
- 11. Freestanding Sign. A sign, supported by one (1) or more columns, uprights or braces, in or upon the ground, but not attached to any building. A sign attached to a flat surface not a part of the building, such as a fence or wall, shall be considered a freestanding sign. A monument sign, as defined herein below, shall also be considered a freestanding sign.
- 12. Flashing Sign. An illuminated sign on which the artificial or reflected light is not maintained stationary and constant in intensity and color at all times when in use.
- 13. Informational Sign. A sign of a public or quasi-public nature which identifies or locates a hospital, public building, college, university, public parking area, historic area, major tourist attraction, public recreation area or similar public or quasi-public activity, which shall be approved on a case-by-case basis by the Planning Coordinator.
- 14. Internally Illuminated Sign. Any sign designed to radiate artificial light from within itself.
- 15. Marquee. A permanent structure, awning or canopy projecting beyond a building wall at an entrance to a building or extending along and projecting beyond the building's wall and generally designed and constructed to provide protection against the weather.
- 16. Monument Sign. A ground mounted sign which is mounted on a contiguous base having a minimum width of at least ninety percent (90%) of the sign width and its supporting structure and not attached to any building.
- 17. Off Premises Directional Sign. A sign which is not located on the same premises as the use to which it refers and which is intended to provide information as to the identity and location of use, but which does not otherwise qualify as an advertising sign.
- 18. Outdoor Advertising Sign. A freestanding or building mounted sign which bears a message which does not pertain to the use of the property, where the sign is located, and which does not identify the place of business, if any, where the sign is located as the purveyor of merchandise or services upon the property. Outdoor advertising signs may also be referred to as "billboards" or "poster panels", but such signs shall not be interpreted to mean informational signs allowed by this Article.
- 19. Planning Coordinator. Reference Article 9 of the Washington County Zoning Ordinance for Planning Coordinator definitions and duties.

- 20. Projecting Sign. A sign which is attached and perpendicular to the face of a wall of a building and which extends 18 inches or more from the building wall or face.
- 21. Real Estate Sign. A temporary sign which advertises the sale, lease, rental or display of the lot or building upon which such sign is displayed.
- 22. Sign. Any writing, letter work or numeral, pictorial presentation, illustration or decoration, emblem, device, symbol or trademark, flag, banner, pennant or any other device, figure or character which is employed to announce, direct attention to, identify, or make known, and which is visible from a public street or sidewalk or area of public congregation.
- 23. Sign Area. That area which outlines the outer extremities of all letters, figures, characters and delineations, or within an area including the outer extremities of the framework or background of the sign, whichever includes the larger area. The support for the sign background, whether it be columns, a pylon, or a building or part thereof, shall not be included in the sign area. The area of a cylindrical or spherical sign shall be computed by multiplying the diameter of the cylinder by the height of the sign.
- 24. Street Frontage. The entire length of that part of a lot that fronts on a public street, as defined by the plat of record for the subject lot.
- 25. Wall Sign. A building mounted sign which is attached to, painted on, inscribed upon, or deriving its major support from a wall and which projects less than 12 inches from the wall.
- 26. Window Sign. A sign painted onto or physically affixed to a building window including upper floor windows and the glazing of doors or signs legible from any vehicular public right-of-way through a building window, limited to ten percent (10%) of the total glass area of the window in which they are placed.

C. Sign Permit Requirements:

- 1. No sign shall be erected, installed, used, altered, relocated, replaced or reconstructed until a sign permit has been issued by the Planning Coordinator.
 - * Freestanding signs require a permit to be issued by the Department of Transportation (DOT) before the Planning Coordinator may issue a permit.
- 2. To obtain a permit, the following information shall be provided to the Washington County Planning Office:
 - a. A detailed plan to include sign placement, size, height, graphic information, electrical requirements, and licensed electrician contact information.
 - b. A site plan sufficient to assess site distance determination based on setbacks, and NC Department of Transportation standards; refer to Zoning Ordinance, Article 8, Site Plan.

- c. After review and approval of the permit application, the Planning Coordinator shall determine the appropriate fee based on the budgeted fee schedule approved by the Washington County Board of Commissioners. Fees are based on the area of all visible sides of the sign, including trim area.
- d. Upon payment of the sign permit fee, the permit shall be issued, and work can commence.
- e. Sign permit fees, according to the annual budget, can be found below. For more information, please reference the Building Inspection and Zoning Permits Fee Schedule, Section 14.

3. Should the Planning Coordinator determine the proposed sign is not in accordance with this Ordinance, the owner of the business or property may apply to the Planning Board for a plan review. The Planning Board, along with the Planning Coordinator, after consideration of design, location, construction, method of operation, and the effect on nearby property, will determine if adverse effects can be avoided by the imposition of any special requirements or conditions attached to the sign permit. If no remedy can be concluded, see Section I of this Ordinance for appeal and remedy to the Zoning Ordinance.

D. Prohibited Signs:

- 1. Signs located or illuminated which provide a background of colored lights blending with traffic signal lights which may confuse motorists.
- 2. Roof signs to be fastened to or supported by any roof structure.
- 3. Any and all signs, except official notices of Washington County, attached to trees, utility poles, public property, or on any unapproved supporting structure.
- 4. Any sign projecting over a public right-of-way.
- 5. Pole signs on any residential property.
- 6. Directory signs are prohibited in all residential zones, except Churches.

E. Permitted Signs for Identification in a Residential Zone:

1. Freestanding Signs:

All freestanding signs for these zones shall have a maximum height of eight (8) feet and shall not be located within five (5) feet of public street right of way or property line and shall not be located within ten (10) feet of any alley, private street, or driveway intersecting a public or private street:

- a. *Church, Institutional, or Civic Use* One (1) freestanding monument sign, limited to 32 square feet, for a church, school, park, playground, library, museum, or quasi-public use. An additional area not exceeding 44 square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base, and not a part of the message portion.
- b. Entrance to Subdivisions or Facilities One (1) freestanding monument sign per entrance identifying a subdivision, nursing home, daycare, facility, or mobile home park, limited to a maximum of four (4) feet by eight (8) feet. Two (2) may be permitted in conjunction with a median and if approved in the original site plan.
- c. Bed and Breakfast One (1) sign, not exceeding 12 square feet in area identifying a bed and breakfast, inn, or tourist home is allowed. An additional area of 16 square feet may be devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base, and not a part of the message portion.

2. Building Mounted Signs:

Multi-family building identification used to identify the address only. Size is limited in aggregate area to ten (10) square feet.

3. Directory Signs:

Allowed only for places of Worship in a residential use, not to exceed 16 square feet, with additional 24 feet devoted to architectural elements which serve as support or base which are not a part of the message area.

F. Permitted Signs for Commercial Use:

The following accessory illuminated or non-illuminated signs shall be permitted for commercial use:

1. Freestanding Signs:

- a. One (1) freestanding or monument sign for identification of a single business establishment shall be limited to a 32 square feet area. An additional area not exceeding 44 square feet may be devoted to elements which serve as support or base and are not part of the message portion.
- b. Business identification sign for a group of two (2) or more contiguous stores or businesses per building and less than 60,000 gross leasable square feet shall be combined into a single freestanding or monument sign advertising all businesses on the premises. The combined sign shall not exceed 48 square feet in area. An additional area not exceeding 64 square feet may be devoted to elements which serve as support or base for such sign, and which are not part of the message portion.

2. Building Mounted Signs:

a. One (1) sign per wall, projection, canopy, awning, or Marquee will be limited to two (2) square feet of sign per linear foot of building frontage.

3. Directory Signs:

- a. Business directory for a single occupant commercial building One (1) directional sign is allowed per commercial building. Such directory signs shall not exceed 16 square feet in area when the directory is freestanding. An additional area not exceeding 24 square feet may be devoted to architectural elements may serve as support or base for such sign so long as it shall not be part of the message portion of the sign.
- b. Business directory for a group of two (2) or more contiguous stores or businesses per building and less than 60,000 gross leasable square feet One (1) directory sign is allowed, not to exceed 24 square feet in area. When a directory is free standing, an additional area not exceeding 36 square feet may serve as support or base for such sign so long as it shall not be part of the message portion of the sign.

4. Electronic, Illuminated, and Digital Signs

Signs that use technologies such as LCD, LED and Projection to display content such as digital images, video, streaming media, and information. Digital signs are prohibited except for the following:

a. Attached, as a wall sign, not exceeding 150 square feet in area, per sign, to a civic building where the civic building contains one (1) or more places of public

assembly having a single-room seating capacity of no less than 1,000. No more than one (1) digital sign shall be permitted on a building façade facing the same public street.

- b. As a ground sign, not exceeding 250 square feet in area erected on a supporting structure, mast, post, or pole no more than 20 feet in height, on a lot containing (i) a civic building where the civic building contains one (1) or more places of public assembly; or (ii) an outdoor sports or entertainment facility having a seating capacity of no less than 2,000. No more than one (1) digital ground sign shall be permitted on a lot for each public street abutting the lot. Subject to the prior limitation, multiple signs may face the same public street. A ground sign is not attached, supported or suspended to or from any building or structure.
- c. Illuminated and digital signs shall be permitted to provide information such as time, temperature, date, and public announcements related to the business on-site only.
 - i. Such signs shall be permitted only as part of an otherwise permitted sign or in conjunction with a permitted replacement of an existing sign, provided that the illuminated portion shall be at least 15% of the total square footage area of the sign and shall not exceed 35% of the total square footage area of the sign.
 - ii. Messages on such signs shall not change more than seven (7) times per minute. In no case shall an animated presentation or animated change of frame be allowed.
 - iii. Illuminated signs, should it be an addition to an existing sign, shall be comparable in composition, durability, and workmanship to the existing sign.
- d. Digital signs shall not display any strobe lighting effects. For the purposes of this section, strobe lighting effects are bright flashes of light at a frequency of greater than 1Hz ((or one (1) flash of bright light per second)) where the brightness of the flashing light is two (2) times brighter than the signs illumination immediately prior to and subsequent to the strobe flash of light.
- e. Digital signs may not cause distraction or safety hazards to drivers. For the purposes of this section, digital signs shall not contain flashing lights (as outlined in F4d), bright illuminating colors that blend in with traffic lights (see D1) and may not be erected within 200 square feet of a roadway. Washington County reserves the right to declare a sign a distraction or safety concern, and therefore a violation of the Washington County Sign Ordinance, at any given time.

- f. Digital, electronic, and illuminated signs shall be limited to those lighted internally with glass or plastic faces bearing the advertisement; provided however, that exposed neon tubing and exposed incandescent or other bulbs not exceeding 15 watts each shall be permitted.
- g. The following materials shall be strictly prohibited in the use of any digital sign:
 - i. Flame (even as a source of light); and
 - ii. Exposed neon lighting.

5. Window Signs:

Signs displayed in windows of store fronts shall not cover greater than 10 percent of the total area of the windows of such store fronts and shall not count toward the total area permitted for wall signs.

6. Additional Regulations:

a. Individual freestanding signs for individual shopping center tenants shall not be permitted. For the purpose of this section, lawfully subdivided out parcels which have been depicted on the approved shopping center site plan shall be considered as separate parcels and may be signed as such

b. Sign Materials:

- i. *General.* All signs shall be constructed of weather-resistant material designed expressly for signs.
- ii. Pole style ground signs. All pole style ground signs with support(s), upright(s), bracing(s), or framework(s) that include a pole encasement shall meet the following requirements with the exception of pole style ground signs for street signs, manufactured home park signs, interstate signs, and historical identification signs which shall be exempt from the requirements of this section.
 - The support(s), upright(s), bracing(s), or framework(s) shall be encased in an ornamental shell of stone, brick, ornamental metal, or similar materials, and shall be a minimum width of one-fourth of the width of the sign face.
 - 2. The sign shall be constructed of an external support structure including stone, brick, ornamental metal, or similar materials, provided that the maximum number of supports, uprights,

bracings, or frameworks extending between grade and the base of the sign face shall not exceed two (2).

- c. Gasoline pump island signs at gasoline sales establishments are subject to the following additional conditions:
 - i. Two (2) non-illuminated "self-serve" or "full-serve" signs per pump island not to exceed two (2) square feet each; and
 - ii. One (1) fuel price or promotional information sign per fuel pump not to exceed two (2) square feet.

G. Permitted Signs for Commercial and Corridor Zones:

The following illuminated or non-illuminated signs shall be permitted for commercial and corridor zones:

- 1. Freestanding Signs:
 - a. For buildings with 20,000 Leasable Square Feet or Less:
 - i. Identification sign: 48 square feet with 64 feet of frame or support, not part of message.
 - b. For buildings with 20,000 to 100,000 Leasable Square Feet:
 - i. Identification sign: 64 square feet with 96 feet of frame or support, not part of message portion.
 - c. For buildings with 100,000 or more Leasable Square feet:
 - i. All Combined sites in building Identification sign: 64 square feet with 133 feet of frame or support, not part of message portion.
 - d. Directional signs:
 - i. Directional signs limited in area to eight (8) square feet shall be permitted as accessory signs and not included in any computation of sign area. One (1) sign per entrance or exit not to exceed eight (8) feet in height nor located within ten (10) feet of any street right of way line.
- 2. Building Mounted Signs Commercial and Corridor Zones:
 - a. One (1) sign per wall, projection, canopy, awning, or marquee is allowed and limited to two (2) square feet of sign per linear foot of building frontage is allowed.

H. Outdoor Advertising Signs:

All Outdoor advertising signs will be erected in accordance with North Carolina Department of Transportation's Outdoor Advertising Control Act. Permits for electrical service installation and construction based on the size of the sign are required.

I. Exempt Signs:

The following signs are exempt from the provisions of this article, and may be erected or constructed without a permit, but in accordance with the structural and safety requirements of the building code:

- 1. Traffic signs and signals erected and maintained pursuant to and in discharge of any federal, state, or county government function
- 2. Changing of message content of changeable copy sign
- 3. Temporary, non-illuminated real estate sale or lease signs
- 4. Non-illuminated identifying sign for official state automobile inspection station not to exceed 10 square feet
- 5. Temporary, non-illuminated construction signs, not more than 32 square feet in area erected for new construction work
- 6. Non-illuminated No Trespassing signs, limited in area to two (2) square feet
- 7. Handicapped parking space sign not exceeding two (2) square feet in area
- 8. Political signs not exceeding eight (8) square feet, erected no earlier than 30 days prior to election, and must be removed no later than seven (7) days after election.
- 9. Civic/charitable signs: Temporary advertising activities may be erected on any property, as long as one (1) side of such sign shall not exceed 16 square feet, no earlier than four (4) weeks prior to the event, and must be removed no later than one (1) week after the activity
- 10. Display of a National, State, or Municipal flag not exceeding 72 square feet in area per side
- 11. Memorial plaques such as tablets and historic markers: Tables or markers erected or approved by the State of North Carolina or Washington County.
- 12. Seasonal displays and decorations which do not advertise a product or service.
- 13. Identification signs: Not to exceed one (1) square foot in display area bearing only addresses or names of occupants of the premises and located on privately owned property.
- 14. Instructional signs: Erected on private property, not to exceed six (6) square feet in display area, erected strictly for the direction, safety or convenience of the public, including signs which identify restrooms, parking area entrances or exits, freight entrances, and similar devices, warning, danger, and no trespassing signs.
- 15. Real Estate signs: Signs pertaining to realty on the premises offered for sale or rent, not exceeding four (4) square feet in area and not illuminated. Such a sign may be

- placed not closer to a front property line than ten (10) feet. There shall be a limit of one (1) such sign per street frontage.
- 16. Signs advertising agricultural products produced on the premises: Not to exceed 16 square feet in area. There shall be a limit of one (1) such sign per street frontage.
- 17. Any and all signs erected before the implementation of this Article.

J. Appeals and Remedies:

This Ordinance endeavors to create a process by which the Planning Coordinator, the Planning Board, and the Board of Adjustments can address and implement zoning and land use in such a way as to reconcile the desires of future applicants with the health, safety, and general welfare interests of the County. However, there may be special and unusual circumstances which arise within the administrative process that dictate that an application receives special attention in pursuit of fairness and sound planning practices. Therefore, variances to the application of this Ordinance which are outside the purview of the Planning Coordinator and the Planning Board, the Board of Adjustment is provided as a means of increasing the flexibility of the Ordinance. Please reference Article 10 of the Washington County Zoning Ordinance for appeal requirements and procedures.

K. Enforcement:

This Article will be enforced by the County Manager and Planning Coordinator. For more information about enforcement authority or procedures of this Article, please reference Article 9F and Article 9H of this Zoning Ordinance.

PURPOSE: To review and adopt the amended updated Smoking Ordinance.

BACKGROUND:

At the September board meeting, a request was made to define enforcement mechanisms more clearly for the smoking ordinance. Staff have updated language accordingly. Now, enforcement lies in the hands of the individual responsible for maintaining security in each non-smoking area, which in most county areas will be the County Manager or their designee. The updated language also now clearly states that the penalty is an infraction (see definition below) and the requisite fine, which can only be given out following an oral or written warning.

An infraction is a technical term defined by state law. It must be issued by a law enforcement officer and enforced as a non-criminal offense in accordance with applicable statutes. Any fines collected are payable toward the local school system in the same manner as other fines per state law.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING SMOKING IN COUNTY BUILDINGS AND VEHICLES

Whereas, counties are granted broad police power authority to protect the health, safety and welfare of county employees and the general public of N.C.G.S. 153A-121 and authority to regulate the use of county property by N.C.G.S. 153A-169.

Whereas, it is the public interest to improve indoor air quality, reduce fire hazards, and minimize any health risks associated with involuntary exposure to environmental tobacco smoke;

Now, therefore, Be It Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the county of Washington, North Carolina, that:

Section 1. Definitions.

- (a) "Smoking" shall mean the inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying of a lighted pipe, cigar, cigarette or other combustible tobacco product.
- Section 2. Smoking Prohibited in County Buildings. It shall be unlawful for any person to smoke in any building or facility or portion of a building or facility now or hereafter owned, leased, operated, occupied, managed or controlled by the county.
- Section 3. Exemptions. County's now or hereafter owned or leased vehicles when non-smokers are not present.
- Section 4. <u>Penalty.</u> Violation of this ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor punishable in accordance with N.C.G.S. 153A-123.
- Section 5. Conflict of Laws. If any portion of this ordinance or the enforcement thereof is found to be preempted by state or federal law, such preemption shall not operate to invalidate the rest of the ordinance and the same shall remain in full force and effect. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 6. <u>Effective Date</u>. This ordinance shall be effective upon adoption.

Washington County Smoking and Tobacco Use Ordinance

Adopted October 7th, 2024

PROHIBITION ON *smoking and the use of tobacco products, in government buildings, vehicles, and grounds (including the County park system).*

WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), smoking is the leading cause of preventable death in the United States (U.S.); and

WHEREAS, each year, cigarette smoking causes more than 480,000 deaths, which is nearly one in five people, in the United Statesⁱ; and

WHEREAS, the CDC reports that smoking habits and tobacco product use is started and established primarily during adolescence; with nearly 90% of adults who smoke cigarettes daily beginning smoking by age 18; and

WHEREAS, since 2014, E-cigarettes have been the most common tobacco product among youthⁱⁱ; and

WHEREAS, each day, close to 1,200 kids under 18 try their first cigarette and close to 100 kids become new, regular smokers; and

WHEREAS, children model adult behavior and benefit from positive models of non-smoking behavior and positive reinforcement of healthy lifestyle messagesⁱⁱⁱ; and

WHEREAS, research shows there is no safe level of exposure to tobacco or secondhand smoke, because even brief exposure can trigger harmful changes in the cardiovascular system and cause the onset of serious diseases such as lung cancer, heart disease, and strokes in smoking and non-smoking adults^{iv}; and

WHEREAS, on January 2, 2010, North Carolina Session Law 2009-27 entitled "An Act To Prohibit Smoking In Certain Public Places And Certain Places Of Employment," became effective, authorizing local governments to adopt and enforce ordinances "that are more restrictive than State law and that apply in local government buildings, on local government grounds, in local vehicles, or in public places"; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to NCGS § 130A-498 and NCGS § 153A-121(a), which authorize local governments to restrict smoking in public places, and otherwise regulate, prohibit, or abate any act, by ordinance, which may be detrimental to the health and safety of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of County Commissioners are committed to providing a safe and healthy workplace in all county owned and controlled facilities, for

county employees, citizens, and the visiting public, and wishes to minimize the harmful effects thereon of smoking and tobacco use (including e-cigarette use); and

WHEREAS, the Martin-Tyrrell-Washington District Health Department provides support to employees and residents who wish to quit the use of tobacco products and encourages them to talk with their health care provider about quitting, ask about appropriate pharmacotherapy available through their health insurance plan or employee's insurer, and to use the free quitting support services of the North Carolina QuitlineNC at 1-800- QUIT-NOW (1-800-784-8669); and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of County Commissioners finds and declares that in order to protect the public health and safety, it is in the best interest of the citizens of Washington County to adopt this Ordinance to establish certain rules prohibiting the use of smoking and other tobacco products and use in public places and in county owned or controlled buildings, grounds and vehicles.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Washington County Board of County Commissioners that the following rules & regulations pertaining to smoking and tobacco use are hereby established and adopted as follows:

Section 1. Authority.

This ordinance is enacted pursuant to NCGS 130A-498, and 153A-121(a).

Section 2. Definitions

- (a) "County building". A building owned, leased as lessor, or the area leased as lessee and occupied by the County.
- (b) "County vehicle". Any vehicle owned, leased, or otherwise controlled by the County and assigned permanently or temporarily to its employees, agencies, institutions, or facilities for official County business.
- (c) "E-cigarette". Any electronic oral device that employs a mechanical heating element, battery, or electronic circuit that can be used to heat a liquid nicotine solution or any other substance, and the use or inhalation of which simulates smoking. This term shall include any such device, whether manufactured, distributed, marketed, or sold as an ecigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, or under any other product name or description.
- (d) "**Employee**". A person who is employed by Washington County, or who contracts with the County or a third person to perform services for the County, or who otherwise performs services for the County with or without compensation.
- (e) "Grounds". An unenclosed area owned, leased, or occupied by the County.
- (f) "Local health department". The district health department, public health authority, or county health department, the jurisdiction of which includes the County. Initially, this term shall mean the Martin-Tyrrell-Washington District Health Department.

- (g) "County parks system". Any tract of land or body of water comprising part of the County's parks, playgrounds, recreation areas, greenways, or trails.
- (h) "Smoking". The use or possession of a lighted cigarette, lighted cigar, lighted pipe, or any other lighted tobacco product.
- (i) "Tobacco product". Any product containing or derived from tobacco that is intended for human consumption, whether chewed, smoked, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, or ingested by any other means, including but not limited to cigarettes; e- cigarettes; cigars; little cigars; snuff; and chewing tobacco. A tobacco product excludes any product that has been approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product, as a tobacco dependence product, or for other medical purposes, and is being marketed and sold solely for such an approved purpose.
- (j) "Universal 'No Smoking' Symbol". Symbol consisting of a pictorial representation of a burning cigarette enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across it.
- (k) "Universal 'No Smoking and Use of Tobacco Products Prohibited' Symbol". Symbol consisting of a pictorial representation of a burning cigarette and a tobacco product enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across it.

Section 3. Areas in Which Smoking and the Use of Tobacco Products are Prohibited or Permitted.

- (a) Except where expressly permitted pursuant to section (c) below or otherwise by applicable state law, smoking and the use of tobacco products are strictly prohibited at all times:
 - i. In Washington County buildings (including those in the County park system);
 - ii. In Washington County vehicles;
 - iii. On Washington County grounds;
 - iv. On the grounds of the Washington County parks system; and
- (b) The prohibition on smoking and the use of tobacco products in the places listed in section (a) above includes those times when they are being used for private events.
- (c) Areas in Which Smoking and the Use of Tobacco Products are Permitted. Smoking and the use of tobacco products are not regulated by this rule in the following places:
 - i. A private residence
 - ii. A private vehicle
 - iii. Within ten (10) feet of any specifically designated public smoking area posted as such by the County.

Section 4. Implementation.

- (a) The preliminary implementation period of this Ordinance shall be from the date of its initial adoption until January 1st, 2025. Afterwards this Ordinance shall be deemed in full continuous force and effect.
- (b) During the preliminary implementation period, and continuing thereafter, the County shall exercise reasonable efforts to inform its employees, citizens, and visiting members of the public about the implementation of these rules including without limitation:
 - i. Posting signs meeting all the requirements in Section 5 of this Ordinance.
 - ii. Removing all ashtrays and other smoking receptacles from places where smoking and tobacco products are prohibited.
 - iii. Informing a person who is smoking or using a tobacco product in violation of this Ordinance about its existence, and requesting such person immediately cease from continuing to engage in any prohibited activity or conduct. If the person does not comply, contact the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Section 5. Signage. The signs referred to in Section 4 of this Ordinance should:

- (a) State in English and Spanish the applicable prohibition for the area (e.g. smoking and the use of tobacco products are prohibited) and include the applicable universal symbol (e.g., the "No Smoking and Use of Tobacco Products Prohibited" symbol).
- (b) Be of sufficient size to be clearly legible to a person of normal vision and be conspicuously posted.
- (c) Be posted at the entrance to each Washington County building and in other locations within the building reasonably calculated to inform employees and the public of the prohibition.
- (d) Be posted in each Washington County vehicle in areas visible to passengers, provided that their placement does not interfere with the safe operation of the vehicle. If the vehicle is used for undercover law enforcement operations, a sign is not required to be placed in the vehicle.
- (e) Be posted on Washington County grounds in locations and at intervals reasonably calculated to inform employees and the public of the prohibition.
- (f) Be posted on the grounds in the Washington County parks system in locations and at intervals reasonably calculated to inform employees and the public of the prohibition.

Section 6. Enforcement and Penalties

(a) Penalty for Violation. Unless otherwise stated by NCGS § 130A-498(c1) or other laws governing local smoking ordinances, any individual who violates this Ordinance shall first receive an oral or written warning from the individual responsible for maintaining security in any designated non-smoking area

referenced in Sections 3, or their designee. For County-owned or operated facilities, the County Manager or their designee may issue such warnings. The warning will direct the individual to immediately cease prohibited behavior.

If the individual continues to engage in prohibited conduct after the warning, they will be deemed in violation of this Ordinance, constituting an infraction as defined by NCGS § 14-3.1. The violator may be subject to a fine of up to fifty dollars (\$50.00), imposed in accordance with NCGS § 15A Article 66 (Procedure for Hearing and Disposition of Infractions) or other applicable law. Conviction of an infraction under this section will result only in the payment of the fine unless otherwise specified by law.

(b) Additional sanctions for employees. In addition to any penalty under subsection (a), employees of Washington County who violate this ordinance may be subject to disciplinary action consistent with Washington County's personnel policies.

Section 7. Public Education

Washington County shall engage in an ongoing program to explain and clarify the purposes and requirements of this ordinance to employees and citizens affected by it and to guide operators and managers in their compliance with it. In doing so, Washington County may rely upon materials and information provided by the local health department.

Section 8. Severability; Conflict of Laws.

If this ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid for any reason, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the ordinance that can be given separate effect, and to that end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable. All prior ordinances or parts of prior ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 9. Effective Date.

This ordinance shall become fully effective on the 1st day of January 2025 following the implementation period provided for hereinabove.

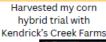
becoming a top pest in the sandier areas of Washington County. I've been working to help growers identify and manage this issue.

PAST EFFORTS

October 2017

MTW District Health Department partnered with the county leadership of each of our three
counties and representatives of Trillium Health Resources to host a community forum to address
opioids. This was a project sponsored by the North Carolina Association of County
Commissioners and approximately 120 state and local leaders attended. Guest speakers
included representatives from Cooperative Extension, North Carolina Attorney General's
Office, Trillium Health Resources, Emergency Medical Services, Department of Social Services,
Martin County Sheriff's Office and MTW Public Health. Participants then had small group
discussions and a list of wants and needs was developed.

Strengthen Opioid Misuse Prevention (STOP) Act of 2017-

- Limits on the number of days worth of opioids that may be lawfully prescribed upon initial consultation for acute injuries
- Requires prescribers to use the NC Controlled Substance Reporting System (NCCSRS)- a
 prescription database (prevents "doctor shopping) and requires providers to conduct a 12
 month history review.
- Requirement for all PAs and NPs practicing in pain clinics to consult with their supervising physician prior to prescribing opioids.

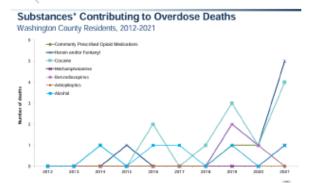

Opioid Trends in Washington County

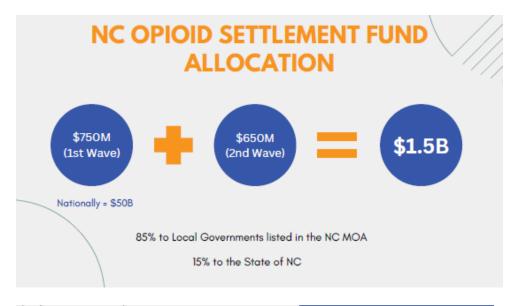


The most common substances contributing to overdose deaths in Washington County in 2012–2021 was Heroin and/or Fentanyl, as well as Cocaine

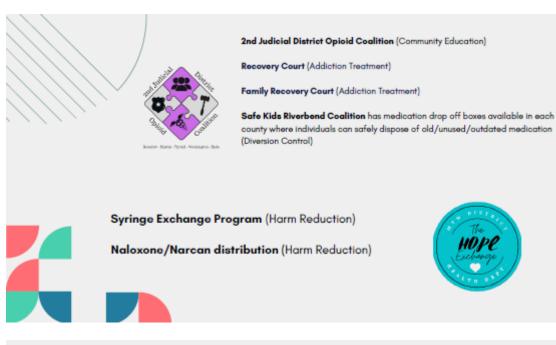

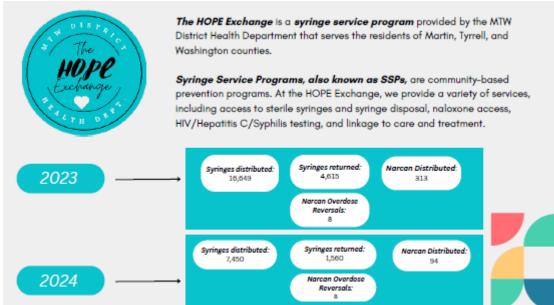

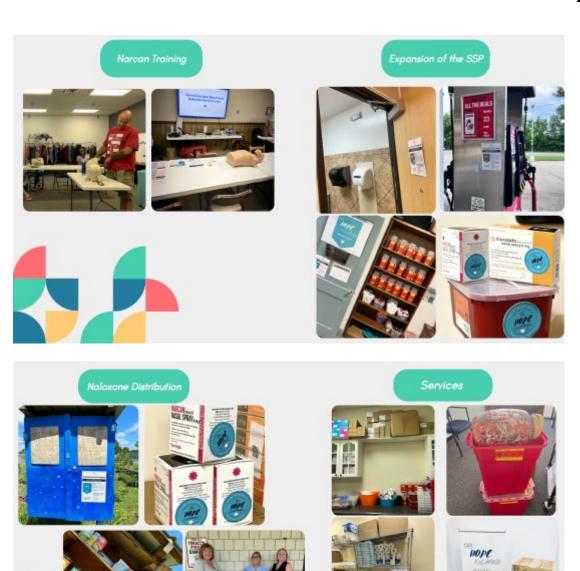

Chair Keyes said it is evident that there is a lot happening with our opioid funds. Commissioner Spruill said someone from MTW came to the Roper Fire Department and taught them how to administer NARCAN. Commissioner Spruill said he heard that some people are hoarding the NARCAN to try and get high on it. MTW said they have heard about this also. Commissioner Spruill asked is there any way to intervene to get them not to do this. MTW said they try to reach out to let the person(s) know they are important and can be treated.

Chair Keyes said she would like to participate in a Summit. The Commissioners thanked MTW for coming.

SMOKING & TOBACCO USE ORDIANCE AMENDMENT: Mr. Jason Squires, ACM spoke about the amendment to the 1993 Smoking & Tobacco Use Ordinance. He also gave credit to Ms. Emma Corbett, our SECU Summer Intern, for her work on this amendment.

Washington County Smoking and Tobacco Use Ordinance

Adopted September 3, 2024

PROHIBITION ON smoking and the use of tobacco products, in government buildings, vehicles, and grounds (including the County park system).

WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), smoking is the leading cause of preventable death in the United States (U.S.); and

WHEREAS, each year, cigarette smoking causes more than 480,000 deaths, which is nearly one in five people, in the United States.ⁱ, and

WHEREAS, the CDC reports that smoking habits and tobacco product use is started and established primarily during adolescence; with nearly 90% of adults who smoke cigarettes daily beginning smoking by age 18; and

WHEREAS, since 2014, E-cigarettes have been the most common to bacco product among youth ii , and

WHEREAS, each day, close to 1,200 kids under 18 try their first cigarette and close to 100 kids become new, regular smokers; and

WHEREAS, children model adult behavior and benefit from positive models of nonsmoking behavior and positive reinforcement of healthy lifestyle messages.^{iii.} and

WHEREAS, research shows there is no safe level of exposure to tobacco or secondhand smoke, because even brief exposure can trigger harmful changes in the cardiovascular system and cause the onset of serious diseases such as lung cancer, heart disease, and strokes in smoking and non-smoking adults. iv; and

WHEREAS, on January 2, 2010, North Carolina Session Law 2009-27 entitled "An Act To Prohibit Smoking In Certain Public Places And Certain Places Of Employment," became effective, authorizing local governments to adopt and enforce ordinances "that are more restrictive than State law and that apply in local government buildings, on local government grounds, in local vehicles, or in public places"; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to NCGS § 130A-498 and NCGS § 153A-121(a), which authorize local governments to restrict smoking in public places, and otherwise regulate, prohibit, or abate any act, by ordinance, which may be detrimental to the health and safety of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of County Commissioners are committed to providing a safe and healthy workplace in all county owned and controlled facilities, for

Washington County Smoking & Tobacco Use Ordinance ORD-065

county employees, citizens, and the visiting public, and wishes to minimize the harmful effects thereon of smoking and tobacco use (including e-cigarette use); and

WHEREAS, the Martin-Tyrrell-Washington District Health Department provides support to employees and residents who wish to quit the use of tobacco products and encourages them to talk with their health care provider about quitting, ask about appropriate pharmacotherapy available through their health insurance plan or employee's insurer, and to use the free quitting support services of the North Carolina QuitlineNC at 1-800-QUIT-NOW (1-800-784-8669); and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of County Commissioners finds and declares that in order to protect the public health and safety, it is in the best interest of the citizens of Washington County to adopt this Ordinance to establish certain rules prohibiting the use of smoking and other tobacco products and use in public places and in county owned or controlled buildings, grounds and vehicles.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Washington County Board of County Commissioners that the following rules & regulations pertaining to smoking and tobacco use are hereby established and adopted as follows:

Section 1. Authority.

This ordinance is enacted pursuant to NCGS 130A-498, and 153A-121(a).

Section 2. Definitions

- (a) "County building". A building owned, leased as lessor, or the area leased as lessee and occupied by the County.
- (b) "County vehicle". Any vehicle owned, leased, or otherwise controlled by the County and assigned permanently or temporarily to its employees, agencies, institutions, or facilities for official County business.
- (c) "E-cigarette". Any electronic oral device that employs a mechanical heating element, battery, or electronic circuit that can be used to heat a liquid nicotine solution or any other substance, and the use or inhalation of which simulates smoking. This term shall include any such device, whether manufactured, distributed, marketed, or sold as an e-cigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, or under any other product name or description.
- (d) "Employee". A person who is employed by Washington County, or who contracts with the County or a third person to perform services for the County, or who otherwise performs services for the County with or without compensation.
- (e) "Grounds". An unenclosed area owned, leased, or occupied by the County.
- (f) "Local health department". The district health department, public health authority, or county health department, the jurisdiction of which includes the County. Initially, this term shall mean the Martin-Tyrrell-Washington District Health Department.

- (g) "County parks system". Any tract of land or body of water comprising part of the County's parks, playgrounds, recreation areas, greenways, or trails.
- (h) "Smoking". The use or possession of a lighted cigarette, lighted cigar, lighted pipe, or any other lighted tobacco product.
- (i) "Tobacco product". Any product containing or derived from tobacco that is intended for human consumption, whether chewed, smoked, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, or ingested by any other means, including but not limited to cigarettes; ecigarettes; cigars; little cigars; snuff; and chewing tobacco. A tobacco product excludes any product that has been approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product, as a tobacco dependence product, or for other medical purposes, and is being marketed and sold solely for such an approved purpose.
- (j) "Universal 'No Smoking' Symbol". Symbol consisting of a pictorial representation of a burning cigarette enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across it.
- (k) "Universal 'No Smoking and Use of Tobacco Products Prohibited' Symbol".
 Symbol consisting of a pictorial representation of a burning cigarette and a tobacco product enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across it.

Section 3. Areas in Which Smoking and the Use of Tobacco Products are Prohibited or Permitted.

- (a) Except where expressly permitted pursuant to section (c) below or otherwise by applicable state law, smoking and the use of tobacco products are strictly prohibited at all times:
 - i. In Washington County buildings (including those in the County park system);
 - ii. In Washington County vehicles;
 - iii. On Washington County grounds;
 - iv. On the grounds of the Washington County parks system; and
- (b) The prohibition on smoking and the use of tobacco products in the places listed in section (a) above includes those times when they are being used for private events
- (c) Areas in Which Smoking and the Use of Tobacco Products are Permitted. Smoking and the use of tobacco products are not regulated by this rule in the following places:
 - i. A private residence
 - ii. A private vehicle
 - Within ten (10) feet of any specifically designated public smoking area posted as such by the County.

Section 4. Implementation.

- (a) The preliminary implementation period of this Ordinance shall be from the date of its initial adoption until January 1st, 2025. Afterwards this Ordinance shall be deemed in full continuous force and effect.
- (b) During the preliminary implementation period, and continuing thereafter, the County shall exercise reasonable efforts to inform its employees, citizens, and visiting members of the public about the implementation of these rules including without limitation:
 - Posting signs meeting all the requirements in Section 5 of this Ordinance.
 - Removing all ashtrays and other smoking receptacles from places where smoking and tobacco products are prohibited.
 - iii. Informing a person who is smoking or using a tobacco product in violation of this Ordinance about its existence, and request such person immediately cease from continuing to engage in any prohibited activity or conduct. If the person does not comply, contact the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Section 5. Signage. The signs referred to in Section 4 of this Ordinance should:

- (a) State in English and Spanish the applicable prohibition for the area (e.g. smoking and the use of tobacco products are prohibited) and include the applicable universal symbol (e.g., the "No Smoking and Use of Tobacco Products Prohibited" symbol).
- (b) Be of sufficient size to be clearly legible to a person of normal vision and be conspicuously posted.
- (c) Be posted at the entrance to each Washington County building and in other locations within the building reasonably calculated to inform employees and the public of the prohibition.
- (d) Be posted in each Washington County vehicle in areas visible to passengers, provided that their placement does not interfere with the safe operation of the vehicle. If the vehicle is used for undercover law enforcement operations, a sign is not required to be placed in the vehicle.
- (e) Be posted on Washington County grounds in locations and at intervals reasonably calculated to inform employees and the public of the prohibition.
- (f) Be posted on the grounds in the Washington County parks system in locations and at intervals reasonably calculated to inform employees and the public of the prohibition.

Section 6. Enforcement and Penalties

(a) Penalty for Violation. Unless otherwise provided by NCGS § 130A-498(c1) or other applicable law, after an initial oral or written notice by any person officially in charge of any prohibited area described in Sections 3, or their designee, or otherwise by the County Manager, or their designee, continuing to smoke in violation of this ordinance constitutes an infraction, and the person committing the infraction may be punished by a fine of not more than fifty dollars (\$50.00). Conviction of an infraction under this section has no consequence other than payment of a penalty.

(b) Additional sanctions for employees. In addition to any penalty under subsection (a), employees of Washington County who violate this ordinance may be subject to disciplinary action consistent with Washington County's personnel policies.

Section 7. Public Education

Washington County shall engage in an ongoing program to explain and clarify the purposes and requirements of this ordinance to employees and citizens affected by it and to guide operators and managers in their compliance with it. In doing so, Washington County may rely upon materials and information provided by the local health department.

Section 8. Severability; Conflict of Laws.

If this ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid for any reason, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the ordinance that can be given separate effect, and to that end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable. All prior ordinances or parts of prior ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 9. Effective Date.

This ordinance shall become fully effective on the 1st day of January 2025
following the implementation period provided for hereinabove.

asked who is collecting this fine and where do people go to pay. She suggested the Ordinance needs to give direction on what to do, like moving to a designated area. If people do not move and the Sheriff is called, do they assess the \$50 penalty? There needs to be documentation of where people can smoke. Commissioner Johnson said the Ordinance needs some clarification. Mr. Potter said the language comes straight out of the statute. The fine would be a civil offense. Mr. Potter said some additional language can be added.

Commissioner Spruill asked if someone has a pack of cigarettes in the Courthouse, as long as they are not smoking, is this a violation? Mr. Potter said as long as they are obeying the ordinance, they will be ok.

Commissioner Walker said the Ordinance should address designated smoking areas. Mr. Potter said the Ordinance gives the County flexibility in designating smoking areas.

The Board asked to have designated smoking areas and more info on how the fine is collected added/explained in the Ordinance.

Mr. Potter said he would bring the Ordinance back to the October meeting.

DEPARTMENTAL UPDATE: Mr. Lee Sasser, Utilities Director, spoke about what is going on in the Water Department. He mainly addressed the flushing of lines (see info below). He explained it is done for public health. It prevents stagnation of the water in the line and helps to pull out any sediment that may have settled in the pipes. There are 126 dead-end lines. The Water Dept. conducts quarterly flushing and some dead-endlines are flushed monthly. The County pumps 188M gallons of water a year and ½ of that is from flushing. Commissioner Johnson asked if the County had less dead-end lines, would there be have less flushing? Mr. Sasser said yes. It would be great if the County had a grid system. Many roads do not loop around to be tied together. Mr. Sasser said his staff completed 20 taps last year, which means the County has gained 20 customers. Mr. Sasser told the Board that the County just got a new SCADA system which should help with getting more accurate numbers. Once a year they do a burnout. A few other items were discussed.

- ➤ Commissioner Keyes said things are looking grand in Washington County! She met with Washington County Fire Commission meeting and agreed with Creswell FD for asking for money from the 5th cent that was implemented in the budget this year.
